#### THE BARNARD UNION.

The first meeting of the Barnard Union was held on Wednesday, October 12th, Miss Coldersleeve, the temporary chairman being in the chair. A temporary membership committee was appointed with the following members. Charlotte Morgan, '04. chairman; Ethel Pool, '03. Helen Cooley, '05, Faith Chipperfield, '06, and Juliet Points, '07. All Upper Classmen and Sophomores who are desirous of joining the Union will please give their names to Miss Cooley, Locker 19, Senior Study, in order that they may be considered by the Membership Committee. The meeting ratifield the following constitution and by-laws:

ARTICLE I. NAME.

This organization shall be called the Barnard Union.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT.

The object of this society shall be to further among the students of Barnard College the development of literary and forensic activity, to foster among undergraduates and alumnæ the spirit of loyalty to the college and the desire to extend its influence abroad.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. Enumeration: There shall be three classes of membership, viz., (1) Active: (2) Associate; (3) Honorary.

Section 2. Eligibility: (1) All students in Barnard College, except Freshmen during the first half year, shall be eligible to active membership. (2) Graduates of Barnard College shall be eligible to associate membership. (3) The following shall be cligible to honorary membership: a. Officers of the University giving instruction at Barnard who are not alumnæ. b. Officers of administration at Barnard who are not alumnæ. c. members except as hereinafter provided. But only such associate members as hold office or serve on committees shall have the privilege of voting, except in the case of graduate officers. (3) Honorary members may serve on special committees, but shall not otherwise vote nor hold regular office in the society.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS.

Section I. Enumeration: The officers shall be: (1) A graduate president, who shall be an associate member. (2) An undergraduate president, who-shall be a senior. (3) A first vice-president, who shall be a junior. (4) A second vice-president, who shall be a sophomore. (5) A secretary, who shall be a junior. (6) A treasurer, who shall be a sophomore. (7) One graduate and one undergraduate editor. (8) The members of the executive committee.

SECTION 2. DUTIES.

(1) The graduate president shall preside at all meetings of the society. (2) The undergraduate president shall preside in the absence of the graduate president at all meetings of the society, and shall be chairman of the program and membership committees. (3) The first vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in the absence of the president. (4) The second vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in the absence of both president and first vice-president. (5) The secretary shall perform such duties as usually devolve upon such an office. To the individual students, such organizations may be profitable, but to our college as a whole, they are a decided disadvantage if not; subordinate to something which represents us all. "College spirit" is

an often misused term, standing for excess zeal along some useless line. In its higher sense, however, it expresses the soul of college life. All the loyalty, strength and courage that each of us possesses is due first to our Alma Mater.

Upon the political achievement of the Union will depend largely its literary activity. We learn from history that no country is able to produce a literature if it has no national life; whereas if the state has unity there generally grows up a representative literature. In the constitution of the Union there is provision made for a monthly BULLETIN supplement which will be devoted to poetry, stories and essays. Our Mortar-board and newspaper are more like records of events than publications of literary merit. But as the Union gains strength we hope for a greater development of literary activity.

We are all very grateful for the organ which has been presented to the college by Mr. Robert G. Ogden in the name of the firm of John Wanamaker. The organ fills an important place in our chapel service, and we thank the friends from whom it came.
