Editorial

Barnard elections will be held April 2, 3, and 4. Are you planning to vote?

Last year, only thirty percent of the student body voted in the elections. This past semester, only about twenty percent of the freshman class turned out to elect their class officers.

Barnard student officers play a vital role in both the long-term and day-to-day operations of the College. Student Government Association officials are responsible for allocating funds to nearly every student group on campus, and they oversee the accounts of these groups. They sponsor events such as the recent blood drive, Winterfest and Springfest, and choose the coordinators for these events. Along with members of the various committees, SGA works closely with the administration to review College policy, and student officials have the power to change these policies. Class officers organize events ranging from Sophomore Week to senior class cocktail parties. More importantly, class officers are the voice of each individual class.

The initiative and direction of both the individual classes and the student population as a whole are reflected directly through Barnard's student officers and committee members. CAMPUS BRIEFS

BC Tuition to Increase 8.5%

As of September 1985, Barnard College costs will be \$15,246. This includes an 8.5% increase in tuition, from \$9,320 to \$10,112, along with a rise in fees covering student activities and health insurance. The decision was initiated by the Budget and Finance Committee, and was later approved by the Board of Trustees.

Sigmund Ginzberg, Vice President of Finance and Administration, is on the staff of both committees. According to him, costs of attending Barnard rise, on the average, every three years, the latest increase is slightly smaller than the last one. He attributed the rise to "the everyday operating cost of an institution." 70% of the College budget is derived from student tuition. Operative costs include a 12.75% increase in the financial aid budget, along with an emphasis on computer satellite stations. The Committee tried to keep the increase as low as possible while maintaining a balanced budget and "keeping in mind the diversity for which Barnard strives," according to Ginzberg. He noted that it was only after quite some discussion that the board was able to come to a de-

cision, and that although "the basic outline of the budget is still rough, the tuition hike has been finalized by the Board to make the students aware as soon as possible." The formal budget will be submitted to the Board of Trustees for finalization after the Resource and Planning Committee meets in three or four weeks.

Currently, Barnard's tuition is not significantly higher than the other Sister colleges. For the '84-'85 academic year, the average tuition among the Seven Sisters was \$9,357, with Harvard/Radcliffe's \$9,800 as the highest, and Vassar's tuition as the lowest at \$8,800. When asked about the effect of the tuition hike on the number of applications, the Director of Admissions, Christine Royer, answered, "I really don't think it will affect the people who apply." A source of discouragement would result, she says, "only from what the Federal Government might do to financial aid." Although the increase brings tuition a bit higher than other comparable academic institutions, Royer notes, "We are in New York City and we offer a very special education with a top rate faculty."

Bellamy at BC

City Council President Carol Bellamy inaugurated a series of town meetings on "Governing New York City," on Wednesday, March 20 in Lehman Auditorium.

Herman Farrell will follow Ms. Bellamy on April 15, and Mayor Ed Koch will appear May 2. All sessions begin with prepared remarks and conclude with a question and answer period.

The series is being jointly sponsored by Barnard's Political Science Department and the Urban Affairs Program.

Gannett Opens

"Significant parts of the public think the media are often inaccurate, unfair, arrogant and preoccupied with bad news," said Robert MacNeil, executive editor and co-anchor of the *MacNeil/Lehrer Newshour*, at the dedication ceremony of the Gannett Center for Media Studies on Wednesday, March 13, at Low Library.

MacNeil pointed out the way in which the media context is perceived may have changed the attitudes of both journalists and the public. The blurred lines between the media for news, entertainment, advertising and politicking affect the distinction between real facts and fiction, and how fairness is defined.

The Media Center, housed in the journalism building, is committed to the advanced study of the mass media and its impact on society. The residential fellows

program brings together scholars and professionals from the mass media to work on research or special projects. The center also has a technological laboratory for studies in communication technology. A series of workshops, conferences and symposiums will also be held by the Center.

MacNeil, a member of the National Advisory Committee of the Center remarked, "There is something in all this and it will be good to have objective and disciplined minds analyzing the phenomena, not just in one survey, hastily taken to test the impact of one event, but regularly to permit some rational assessment of what is going on."

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The following letter, signed by Ramona Romero, was sent to Barnard students on Monday, March 25, 1985.

"We are sad to report that Allison Breidbart has resigned her position as Officer of the Board of the Student Government Association. The content of her letter of resignation, addressed to me, is quoted below.

I hereby submit my resignation as Officer of the Board of the Student Government Association effective immediately. I appreciate your immediate compliance.

The executive board of the Student Government Association regrets Allison's decision. Although Allison's letter does not state why she is resigning, she has indicated to me that she is leaving the board for personal reasons. I want to emphasize our regret and to state that Allison has been one of the most efficient, effective and dedicated members of this board. We thank her for her service to the Barnard community.

The person elected Officer of the Board in the upcoming election (April 23 and 4) will be assuming her duties immediately after the election, rather than at the beginning of the new fiscal year (July 1), as customary.

Not long ago it was made public that Barnard has investments in companies

with operations in South Africa. As you are probably aware, the Faculty Senate voted to recommend that the College divest. At a recent meeting with President Cutler, attended by the SGA executive board, the Student Senator, and one of the Student Reps to the Board of Trustees, the majority of the students present recommended divestment. According to informed members of the Barnard Administration, divestment would have a minimal economic impact on the College.

We are aware that many of us face the prospect of not attaining Barnard housing for the next academic year. In conversations with the president and other administrators, we have expressed the anxiety felt by students about this situation and our feeling that the College should not offer housing to all freshmanmen, unless it is prepared to offer them housing as upperclasswomen. We have been assured that steps are being taken to prevent this from happening again, and that the College is negotiating the lease of a large number of spaces in an undeveloped location that would allow all interested current students to have housing. The College expects to make an announcement about the final result of these negotiations by the beginning of next week.

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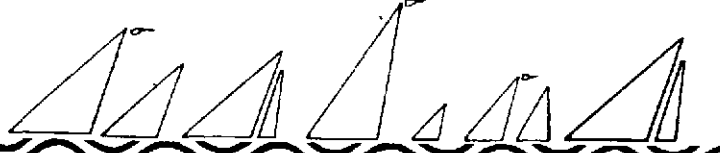
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
