Alumnæ Association.

The following are some of the by-laws adopted by the Alumnæ Association at their recent meeting:

I.—MEMBERSHIP.

All graduates of Barnard College become on graduation members of the Associate Alumnæ, and may retain their membership by complying with the requirements as set forth in Chapter X. of these by-laws.

II.—DIRECTORS.

The Directors shall be eleven in number, to be chosen as herein provided, for terms herein specified.

III.—OFFICERS.

The officers shall be five in number—President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. Each officer shall be balloted for separately, shall be ex-officio a member of the Board of Directors, and shall hold office, both as officer and director, for a term of two years, and until her successor has been duly elected and qualified.

The officers shall be divided into two groups, to be elected in alternate years at the annual business meeting. The President, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer shall constitute the first group; the Vice-President and Recording Secretary, the second. To effect this alteration, at the annual business meeting at which these by-laws are adopted, the Vice-President and Recording Secretary shall be elected for terms of one year. At the expiration of such terms, successors shall be elected for full terms of two years.

V.—DIRECTORS NOT OFFICERS.

There shall be five additional directors, who shall hold office for terms of five years. At the meeting at which these by-laws are adopted, five Directors shall be elected. Each of said five Directors shall be balloted for separately, the first of said Directors so balloted for to serve for a term of five years, the second four years, the third for three years, the fourth for two years, and the fifth for one year. At the annual meeting following the expiration of each of said specified terms there shall be chosen a Director to serve for a term of five years, and until her successor has been duly elected and has qualified.

VII.—COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be four Standing Committees, viz.: The Finance Committee, The Ella Weed Memorial Reading Room Committee, The Statistics Committee, and The Students' Aid Committee.

Sec. 2. There shall also be such other committees appointed by the Board of Directors, from their own numbers or from members of the Association, as said Board of Directors shall from time to time direct.

VIII.—MEETINGS.

Section 1. There shall be an annual meeting at Barnard College on the last Saturday in October, and a social meeting in December or January.

Sec. 2. A special meeting may be called at the request of the President or of ten members.

Sec. 3. Two weeks' notice of the regular business meeting, and at least one week's notice of any special meeting must be given.

IX.—QUORUMS.

Section 1. One-half of the number of members living in the Borough of Manhattan, New York, shall constitute a quorum of the Association.

Sec. 2. Six members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum.

X.—DUES.

Section 1. The annual dues shall be one dollar, payable to the Treasurer at the October meeting.

Sec. 2. Members failing to pay dues for three successive years, after two notices of such arrears have been sent to them, shall cease to belong to the Association.

Sec. 3. A member may be reinstated by paying three dollars.

Sec. 4. Any member may become a life member on payment of twenty-five dollars, the interest of such sum to be applied to the expenses of the Association.

XV.—AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the members of the Association present.

XVI.

Roberts' Rules of Order shall be the final authority in the meetings of this Association.

Debating Society Notice.

A special meeting of the Debating Club was held on Tuesday, November 11th, at 4.30. Mr. Ringwald, coach of the Columbia Debating Society, interested those present by a clear and practical explanation of the essential features of debate.

He said that as the purpose of debate is to win an audience to some point of view, the power of persuasion is very essential. It is also necessary that the subjects chosen be interesting to all listeners, and able to be presented within one hour. As for the debaters themselves, it is important for them to prepare briefs and exchange these beforehand. The members of the club, too, should read some of the references from which the material and statistics have been obtained, and should have an informal discussion after the regular debate. Mr. Ringwald also emphasized the necessity of a rebuttal. Through this, ability is acquired to answer conclusively questions at the moment.

Many other practical suggestions were given, which will certainly aid those eager to attain some skill in debating, and will make the society indebted to Mr. Ringwald for any marked improvement this year.

It is with the utmost satisfaction that we notice the determination on the part of a few students to provide Barnard with suitable and sufficient college songs. Previous efforts in this direction have not been remarkably fruitful. The committee of Undergraduates formerly appointed to receive and select songs from any girl who chose to write them was at no time overwhelmed with contributions; and the few songs submitted were not in general of a kind to suit popular taste. The ordeal of handing in verse to an official committee of judges, seemed to frighten away the lightness and gayety that should characterize college songs.

Now, however, a different method has come into vogue. One class at least has started the practice of singing at its social meetings. The songs are written by various members of the class, who do not aspire to literary achievements, but recognize the wise principle that the effectiveness of a song frequently lies in its simplicity. The formality of having a song officially accepted is thus done away with, and an excellent test of its value, that is, singing it a number of times, is substituted for the old one.

To any class that sees fit to follow the example just quoted, we would suggest that college, rather than class songs should have the first place. Class spirit at Barnard has already arrived at a healthy state of development. What is needed now is broader and deeper college feeling; and we are convinced that this can be attained in no way more effectively than by the singing of songs which appeal to each and every Barnard girl.

Until within the last two years, debating

was not, so far as we know, an element of the college life. Unlike the faculties of Vassar and Wellesley, ours offers no course of this sort and no provision to meet this deficiency had been made by the girls themselves. A Debating Club, started late in the spring of 1901, by a few enthusiastic but very inexperienced Freshmen met, at first, with fair success. But the inability to correct their faults so discouraged the members that nothing but the generous promise of the English Department to assist the scheme has kept life and energy in the club. Under the direction of Mr. Brewster and Miss Gildersleeve the debates will now be held, and so great a stimulus has this promised assistance given the club, that its membership of twenty is already greatly increased. The added interest would warrant, we should think, the holding of more meetings. The benefit to be derived from weekly debates would be inestimably greater than the profit gained from the bi-monthly ones, and would well repay the club for the sacrifice of its time.

TO THE EDITORS OF THE BULLETIN:—

Here is a suggestion from the basket ball people to the rest of the students.

There have been many complaints against the former on account of their lack of achievement in the basket ball field. There is a cause for this deficiency and a remedy. The cause is, first, that athletics is not formally recognized as a department in College, and second, but far more important, that we have not sufficient money for our support. We have barely enough to pay a coach and to meet other small current expenses. What we need is an amount in the treasury which would enable us to travel to other colleges, and to invite their teams in return to Barnard for match games. There is no training for members of a team like that gained in a match game, to say nothing of the experience in playing and confidence in themselves.

There is a remedy at hand if the students are willing to consider it. The Undergraduate Association has a large surplus in its treasury from last year, with the power of using the sum as it pleases. If a part of this money could be devoted to athletics for the use of the Basket Ball Club, a great step would be gained. The teams would be enabled to travel, and, by dint of hard work, to earn for Barnard a name and a place in athletics.

University News

Uses of Earl Hall.

The report of the Secretary of Earl Hall to the Advisory Committee for the month of October shows the largely increasing use of the building by students. The number of different meetings held in Earl Hall, including Chapel services, during the month was 105. The total attendance at such meetings was 2,888. In addition to regular meetings, the average daily attendance on academic days is estimated at 200, making the aggregate attendance for the month nearly 7,000. About twenty organizations, outside of the Christian Association, have used rooms in the Hall. The attention of graduates is called to the fact that Earl Hall offers every convenience and opportunity for personal meeting, for conferences of class officers and for informal class re-unions.

Funeral of Professor Rood.

Ogden Nicholas Rood, Professor of Physics in Columbia University for thirty-eight years, died last Wednesday, of pneumonia. The funeral services took place on Friday, at ten o'clock in Earl Hall. The Rev. Marvin R. Vincent, S. T. D., conducted the services, assisted by Chaplain Van De Water.
