UNDERGRADUATE ASSOCIATION.

A special meeting of the Undergraduate Association was called on Monday, May 9, for the election of the President, Chairman of Executive Committee, Treasurer, and Sophomore Member of the Executive Committee. The final regular meeting of the Association for the year was held in the Theatre Thursday, May 12. At this meeting, the Treasurer, Alice Haskell, '06, reported a balance for the year in the treasury of \$348, mentioning also that a large number of students from each of the four classes were still indebted to the Association for the annual dues, and urging, as a particular favor to the Treasurer and the Sub-Treasurers, that these dues be paid at once. The Chairman of the Executive Committee, Kate Doty, '04," submitted the following report:

Article I.

. It was of course, a far less elaborate performance than most of those we have had lately, but it went off very well; and a great deal of credit is due to Laura Parker, 1905 who was chairman of the committee.

The performers were wise in not attempting to make a particular feature of the chorus singing. Nothing is more tedious than a number of songs, sung in a mediocre fashion. The cast realized this, and created a diversion by keeping up continuous byplay. As a whole the action was lively, and the players entered well into the spirit of the thing as if they enjoyed it themselves.

Particular mention should be made of "Dame Plunkett," "Sylvia Nightingale," and the pair, "Moses Simpkins" and "Betsey Martin." Dame Plunkett had of course, about the heaviest part. The whole play depended on her, and she carried the burden easily and well. Sylvia Nightingale's songs by no means suffered in contrast to the chorus. She has a charming, well trained voice, to which it is a pleasure to listen. Moses and Betsey, together and individually the laughing stock of the school, succeeded admirably in their parts.

After the first part of the debate and after the rebuttal, two students of Normal College and the Barnard Chorus entertained the large audience with songs and recitations. The big Barnard banner and the various class flags were an effective adornment to the gallery in which the Barnard girls gathered to sing and cheer for their Alma Mater. From that one afternoon college spirit received an impetus such as it has never felt before, and, it is to be hoped, will accomplish something definite in the near future. We wish to jog the memory of those students who have not yet paid their subscriptions for the Bulletin. The year is now near its close and the Editors wish to have all accounts settled as soon as possible.

In looking over some early numbers of the Bulletin, we came across one in which there was a financial statement of the Undergraduate Association for the college year ending June 1901. The plan is a good one. It seems to us that there should be public statements of this kind at the close of every college year not only from the Undergraduate Association but also from the various college clubs. It is due to those who contribute to the expenses of an organization that they should have a printed statement of receipts and expenditures. The Treasurer's verbal reports give a more or less definite idea of a club's finances from time to time, but they are incomplete without a final written summary of all business transactions.

The preparation of these statements would be valuable training in careful and accurate keeping of accounts. As societies grow this becomes more and more impor-

tant. Furthermore, if these financial statements were published in the Bulletin they would be easily available to all students for future reference.

We trust that this is a matter that will receive consideration.

REPORT OF COLLEGE ENTRANCE EX-AMINATION BOARD MEETING.

The semi-annual meeting of the College Entrance Examination Board was held at Columbia University on Saturday, May 7. at 10:30 A.M. There were present the following:—

Adelphi College, President Levermore; Barnard College, Dean Gill; Bryn Mawr College, President Thomas; Colgate University, Dean Crawshaw; Columbia College. President Butler; Cornell University, Dean Crane: Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Prof. Tyler; Mt. Holyoke College, President Woolley; New York University. Prof. J. H. MacCracken; Rutgers College, President Scott; Swathmore College, President Swayne; Union College, President Raymond; Vassar College, President Taylor; Wellesley College, Dean Pendleton; Western University of Pennsylvania, Dean Carhart; Women's College of Baltimore, Dean Van Meter; and the following representatives of secondary schools:

Julius Sachs, of New York; Wilvon Farrand, of the Newark (N. J.) Academy; James G. Croswell, of the Brearley School, New York; James L. Patterson, of Philadelphia; Dr. Wm. Gallagher, of Braintree, Mass. The latter gentleman met with the Board for the first time as the representative of the secondary schoolmasters of New England.

The Western Reserve University of Cleveland, O. was admitted to membership in the Board.

The reports covering the educational financial work of the Board were presented and considered. Steps were taken to appoint the readers to serve at the examinations of 1904, as well as examiners to serve for the examinations of 1905. A Committee of the Harvard University Faculty, consisting of Dean Briggs, Dean Hurlbut, and Prof. H. S. White, attended the meeting of the Board and were in conference concerning the work of the Board so far as it affects, or might affect, the examinations for admission to Harvard. It is estimated that nearly, if not quite, 2000 candidates will present themselves at the examinations to begin on June 20 next, these examinations to be held simultaneously in about 150 places throughout the United States and Europe.

Babson of Gloucester, Mass., in the running high jump, made a new record of 4 feet 21/2 inches, while Alice H. B. Elding of Poughkeepsie increased the baseball throw distance to 195 feet 3 inches.

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
