

ARTICLE I. SONG PRACTICE.

Section 1. That undergraduate song practice be held twice a month on the second and fourth Thursday.

Sec. 2. That a committee be appointed by the president to consist of two members from each class to supervise this practice.

Sec. 3., That the duties of this committee shall be:

(1) To absorb the duties of the song committee at present authorized to preserve college songs;

(2) To collect fines for absence from song practice;

(3) To keep an account of the attendance.

Sec. 4. That cheer leaders be elected one for each class by their respective classes.

ARTICLE II. FINES.

Section 1. That a fine of 10 cents be imposed for absence from song practice.

ARTICLE III. SELF-GOVERNMENT CONVEN-TION.

Section 1. That Barnard College cooperate in the convention of the Self-Government Association of the Eastern Colleges by sending two delegates.

Sec. 2. That according to the rule of the convention the first delegate shall be the serve as temporary chairman of the Freshpresident of the Undergraduate Association. Sec. 3. That the second delegate be elected at this meeting from the Junior class. Marguerite Newland was elected delegate to the Self-Government Association.

It was decided that members of the class who had transferred to Teachers College should still have all the privileges of a member except that of holding office.
