ENGLISH will meet with majors an prospective majors and will discuss recent changes in the department's program as well as sign-up for limited enrollment courses MON., APRIL 2, James Room (4th floor Barnard Hall) at 4:15-5pm. CHEMISTRY majors, minors should arrange to see their advisors individually and prospective majors should see any member of the department. EDUCATION open hours: MON., APRIL 16-19 at 1:30-4pm. ENVIRON-MENTAL SCIENCE will meet WED., APRIL 4 and APRIL 11 at 2pm in 334 Milbank. HISTORY and AMERICAN and EUROPEAN STUDIES will meet MON., APRIL 2 at 4pm. in the Ella Weed Room. ORIENTAL STUDIES majors and majors-to-be should arrange to meet individually with Professor Barbara Stoler Miller or Irene Bloom by appointment or during extended walk-in hours. Professor Bloom has extended walk-in hours on MON., APRIL 2 at 12:30-2pm. and TUES., APRIL 3 at 11:30-1:30. PSYCHOLOGY calls its majors and prospective majors to a meeting on WED., APRIL 4, 415 Milbank at 12:15pm. ADVANCED WARNING! COURSE LOTTERIES: ENVIRON-MENTAL SCIENCE BC1001, 331 Milbank, THURS., APRIL 5-13; PSY-CHOLOGY courses, 415 Milbank, TUES., APRIL 17-19.

LAST CALL FOR SOPHOMORES who have not yet seen their advisors for an official audit of the fulfillment of their degree requirements to date: By WED., APRIL 4, every sophomore should have sen her advisor to complete the audit form. The audit establishes both for you and your major advisor-to-be the requirements you have yet to satisfy.

DEADLINE FOR SOPHOMORES TO DECLARE MAJOR: WED., APRIL 11. Obtain form at 107 Milbank, secure signature of Chair of your major department, leave one copy with him/her, and FILE ORIGINAL WITH THE REGIS-TRAR. If still undecided, consult your academic advisor and faculty of departments under consideration. Then make a choice by APRIL 11 even if you remain ambivalent. It is essential that future programs be planned with major requirements in mind. (If you should wish to change to another major within the next semester or so, you may do so simply by securing the approval of your new department and filing a Change of Major form with the Registrar).

INTERESTED IN INSTRUMENTAL INSTRUCTION AT THE JUL-LIARD SCHOOL OR MANHATTAN SCHOOL OF MUSIC? Musically qualified students are invited to audition for September '90 enrollment in a course of music lessons at either conservatory.

JULLIARD: March 15 deadline for MAY 21-23 auditions has passed, but application may still be possible with payment of the \$25 late fee in addition to \$35 application fee.

MANHATTAN: APRIL 16 is deadline for MAY 22-25 auditions; JULY 15 deadline for AUGUST 28-30 auditions. FEE: \$35. Pick up application at Registrar's Office. STUDENTS ON STUDY LEAVE 1990-91: To avoid loss of degree credit, be sure that the content of the courses you select does not overlap with those courses already credited toward your degree. If in doubt, consult the Chairs of appropriate Barnard departments or Dean Schneider, whose approvals are required on the study leave form. Be sure to arrange for enrollment in Barnard courses of your choice for the semester of your return to the campus. This is especially important for seminars, colloquia, lab courses.

SENIORS: Tickets for Commencement will be distributed starting NON., APRIL 30. The sign-up sheet for extra tickets will also be posted on APRIL 30.

DEAN'S LIST REQUIREMENTS FOR '89-90: Minimum GPA of 3.40 for the year, course work to include 12 or more letter-graded points on record for each semester and completed before classes begin for 1990-91. Dean's List students and their parents will be notified by mail during the autumn term.

DEADLINE FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM A COURSE (W recorded): FRI., APRIL 20 at 107 Milbank. No extensions permitted; decision is irreversible.

### Barnard's Housing Crunch Ends

Roving Bulletin staff reporters have uncovered information about what is really happening in next year's housing exchange. Since all available Barnard rooms are being allocated to Columbia University students, Barnard students will be housed in the bowels of Barnard—the tunnel.

Plenty of convenient showering and bathing space will be available in the nearby pool. This year's Barnard Housing lottery numbers will conform to the locker numbers on the lockers in the basement of Barnard Hall. Seniors will enjoy a spacious "single" locker, and juniors will share a "double" with one other junior.

In a bold new plan designed by the Housing Office to increase the feeling of community on campus sophomores will share "triples," and first-year students will share a cozy "quadruple."

Housing Director Judy Bummer is excited about the new plan. "We've been trying to force Barnard women together for years," Bummer said. "I'm thrilled we've found a way to do it so effectively. There has been so much talk lately about generating a greater sense of community on campus. The Housing Office is the first to do something about the situation."

I. M. Sogynist (CC '90) is "outraged that none of the tunnel space is being allocated to Columbia students."

Sogynist, however, is hopeful that next year's arrangement will be more equitable. "Since Columbia now controls Barnard housing it shouldn't be a problem getting the tunnels too next year."

Sogynist feels that Barnard's new plan, in its attempt to be inclusive, excludes him.

"Sure, I like my roomy single on the 17th floor of the tower, but I feel like I'm really missing out on this new feeling of community thing. I want a locker too."

### FUTURE: Slumping in the Fast Track

The current heated debate over the prudence of Barnard's FUTURE plan reflects the inability of community members to confront the college's fundamental problems and adequately implement change. Those opposing FUTURE's development are mere plotters of Barnard's demise, are evil and must be destroyed.

Barnard's recently announced Female Undertaking To Utilize Random Education (FUTURE) plan is the first step toward securing Barnard's place among the great bastions of academic enrichment and will prove wrong the speculating students, alumnae and diverse onlookers from beyond who believe that Barnard will either become a coeducational institution or merge with Columbia during the nineties. Enlarging Barnard's scope of education through post-graduate offerings will produce a more complete woman who is better able to cope with the political, social, economic and scientific problems of the decade.

Briefly, for those unfamiliar with the plan, FUTURE establishes four graduate schools thus enlarging Barnard into a university. Students graduate in as much or as little time as they wish with a MUI (More Useless Information) degree after completing courses in the four schools of Political Gibberish and Rhetoric, Sociability and Cultural Sensitivity, Monetary Grubbery, and Scientific HooHah. These four schools, both collectively and individually, allow students to utilize their liberal arts education in a revolutionary fashion by forcing them to apply their learning skills to real-life situations. Based on the theory that one learns better through doing, SSCS encourages students to participate in internships and long-term projects. Some of those planned include secret spy missions to Bucharest and field trips with terrorists. Students must take a Cultural Sensitivity Aptitude Test (CSAT) as part of the admissions process.


The School for Money Grubbery's founding principle is that making money is good and those who say they enjoy poverty are talking out of their parents' bank accounts. The MG school offers core courses entitled How to Be Cutthroat and Beat Out the Next Person for that Great Job and Gimme, Gimme, Gimme. This curriculum is geared both toward those who are already money grubbing cutthroats and those who cannot balance a checkbook but wish that they could.

Finally, the School for Scientific HooHah teaches students practical, basic scientific knowledge for better day to day living with courses such as Debugging Your Mac and AstroMolecular BioOrganic Physiognomy for the Scientifically Inept.

BC Pres Ellen Nutter-Butter a.k.a. The Fut is a major proponent of this project. "I am sick of saying that Barnard is a small liberal arts college for women, affiliated with a large university, located in the heart of the great city of New York," Futter told reporters at her weekly press conference. "Now I will be able to say 'A bigger Barnard is a better builder.' Besides, this will be a great boost for my future political career."

Up until now, unemployed Barnard seniors have complained that Barnard's curriculum does not provide them with the skills and knowledge necessary to compete in the job market. FUTURE's implementation will provide students with unique resume material that will not only give them an edge over their competition but will also provide them with unparalleled topics for conversation, perfect for interviews, cocktail parties or subway rides. FUTURE will undoubtedly build a better Barnard future.

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


Cowgirl
