Dear Class of 2008,

Between 221 and 206 BCE the first emperor of China, Qin Shi Huang, arranged for the construction of China's first Great Wall. Much of the Great Wall we know today was built during the Ming Dynasty almost two thousand years later. In 19 BCE Herod the Great ordered an extension of the Temple Mount in Jerusalem. What is left of this extension today is a site for pilgrimage and prayer known as The Wailing Wall. In the year 1961 of the Common Era construction began on a wall that would divide East from West Berlin for twenty-eight years. The Berlin Wall fell in 1989, setting in motion the reunification of Germany and attracting an enthusiastic audience for a spontaneous David Hasselhoff concert.

In the spring of 2007, Barnard students bid farewell to McIntosh and prepared for the arrival of a new student center which the Class of 2008 will get to enjoy as alumnae. 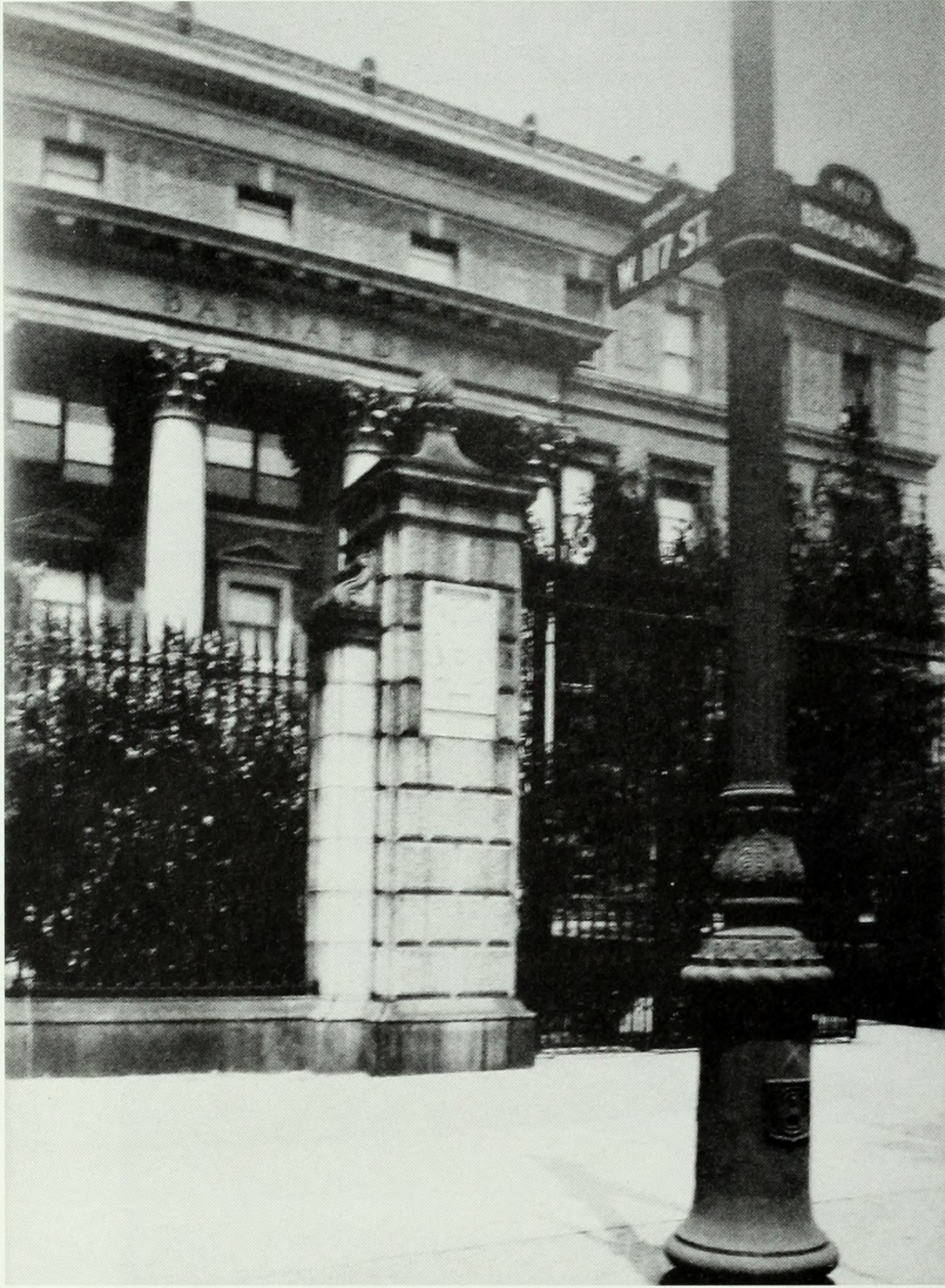

A History of the College



Since it first opened its doors in 1889, Barnard has remained committed to its mission of providing a high quality liberal arts education to promising and high-achieving young women. Barnard was named after Columbia College's tenth president, Frederick A.P. Barnard, who was a strong advocate of women's education. Ironically, he opposed the idea of establishing a separate institution for women and argued for co-education at Columbia in 1879.

Ten years later, with the help of Annie Nathan Meyer, Barnard was established as an affiliate of Columbia University. It began at a brownstone at 343 Madison Avenue with fourteen students and six faculty members. Nine years later, it found a new home at Milbank Hall in Morningside Heights. As an independent institution affiliated with Columbia University, Barnard maintains its own trustees, faculty, and financial responsibilities, but shares its classrooms, resources, and degree with Columbia University.

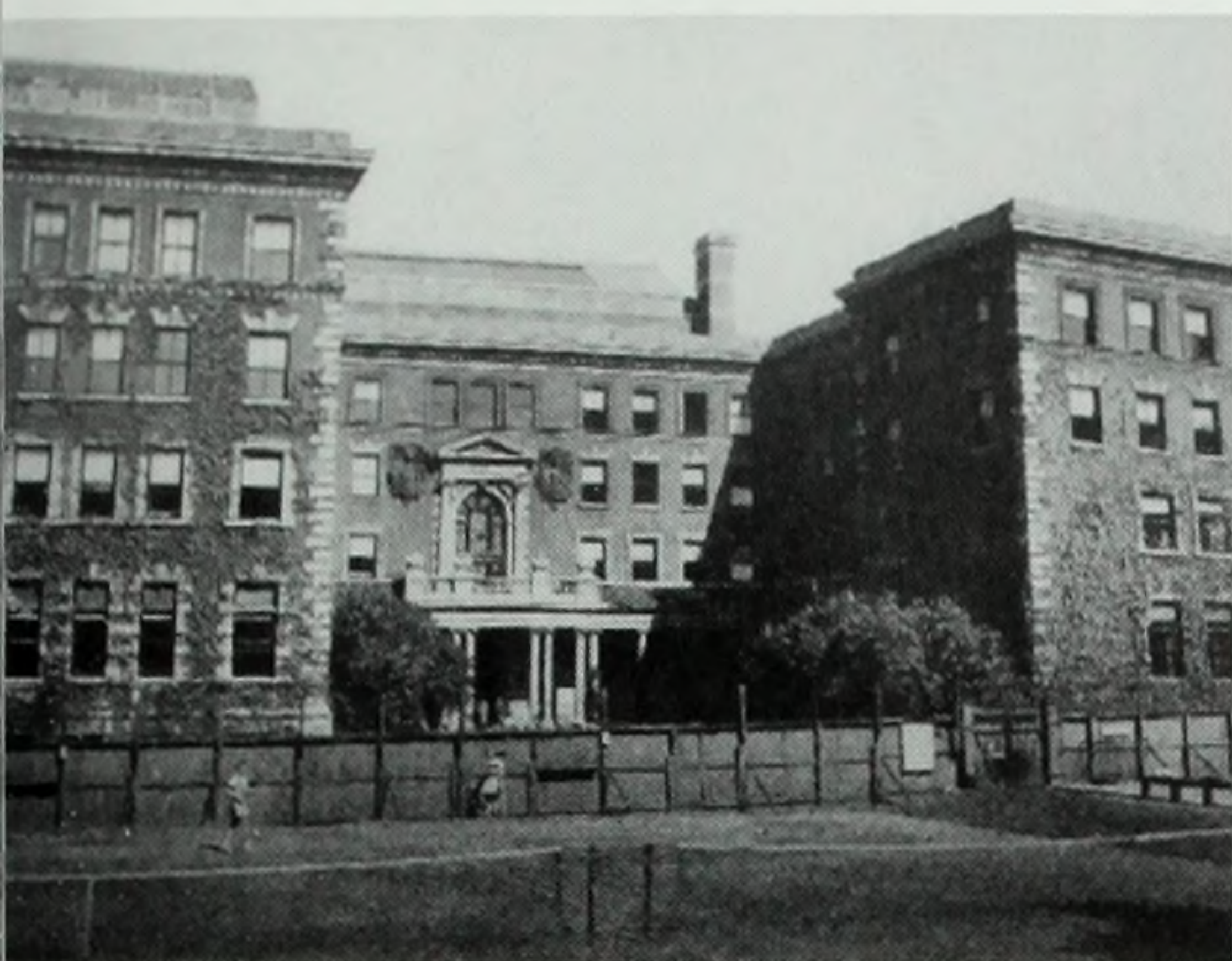

Farewell, President Shapiro!

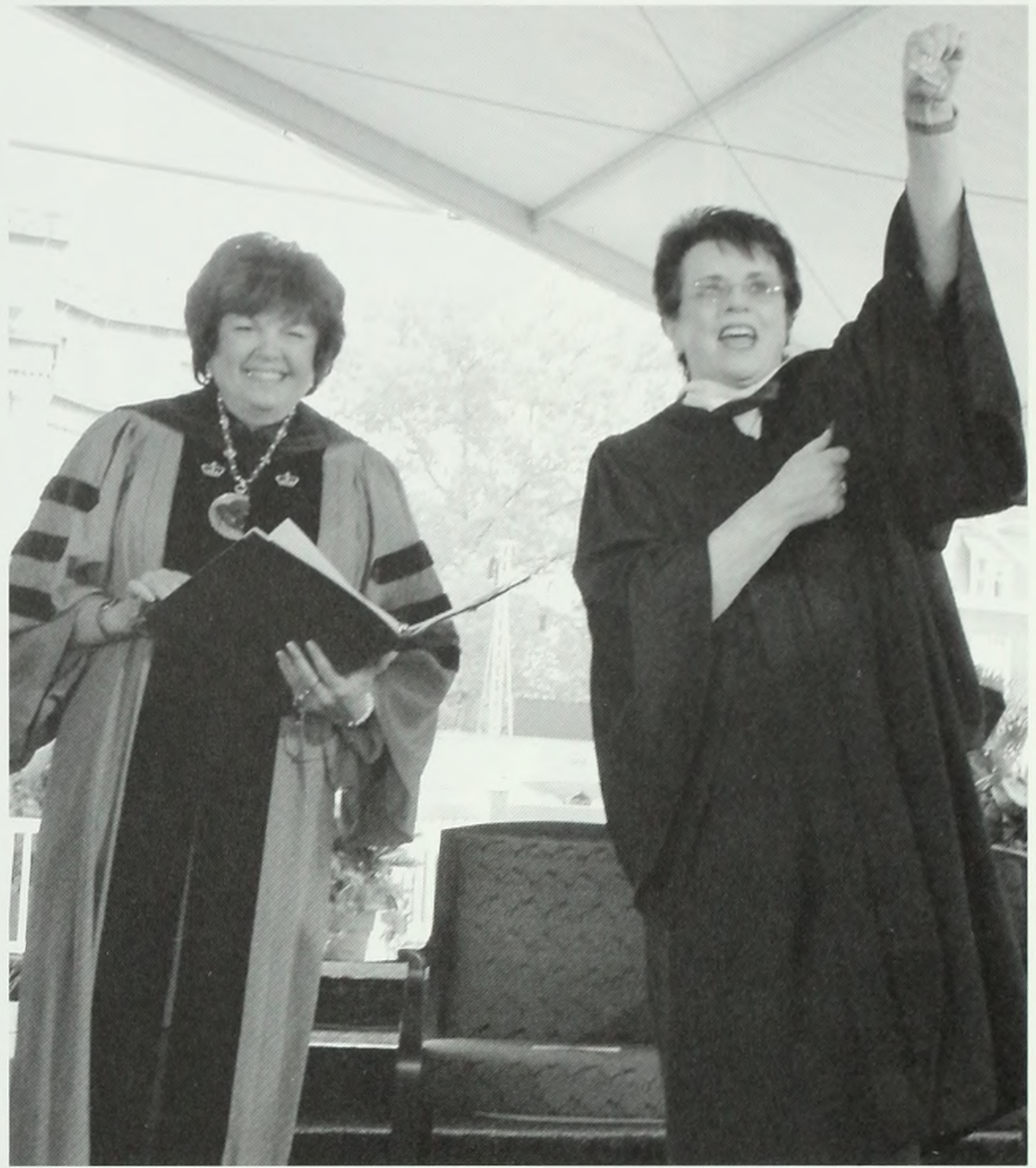


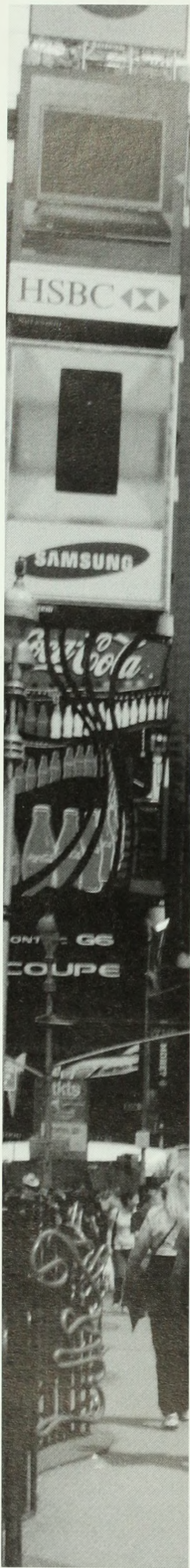

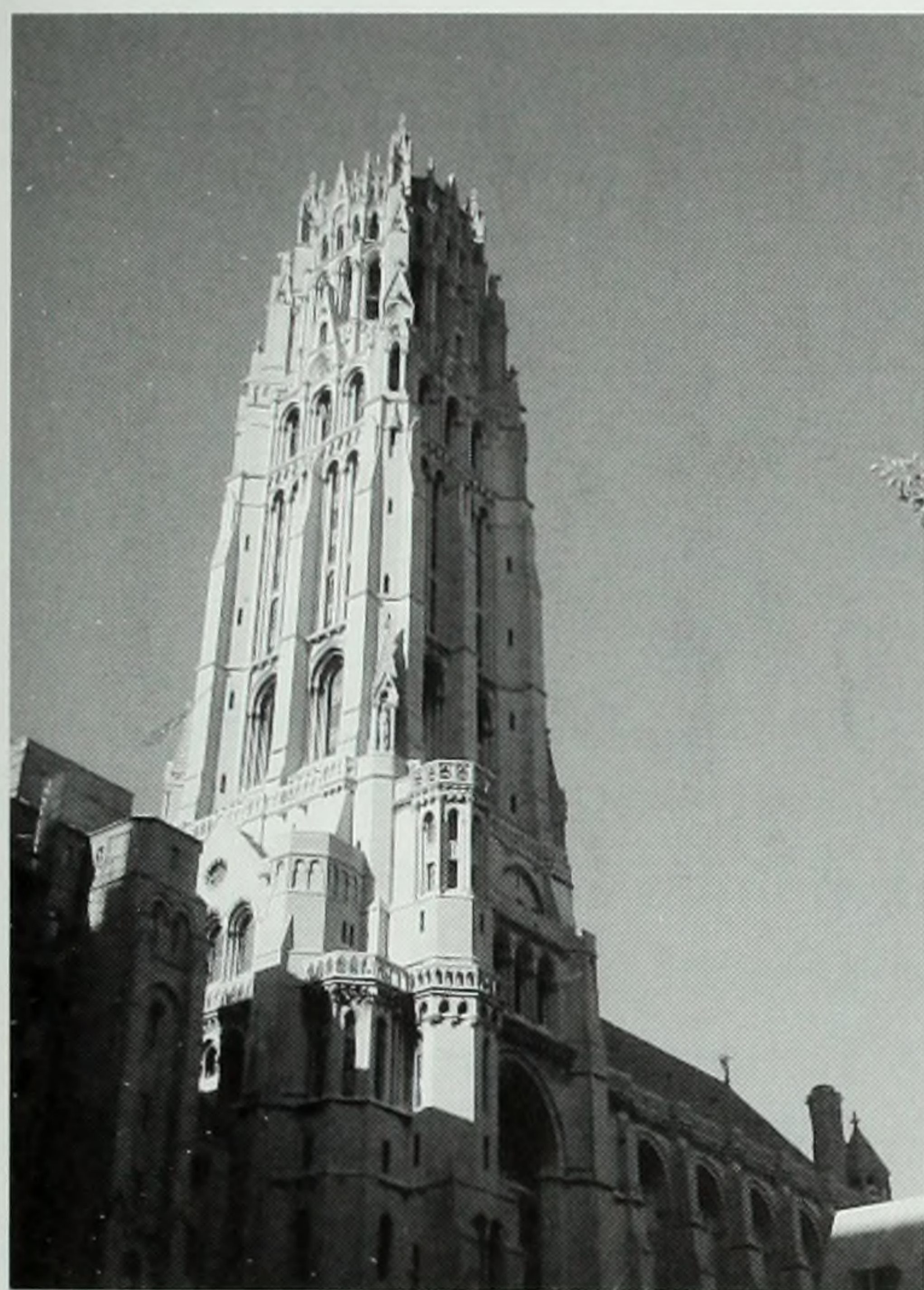


MORNINGSIDE HEIGHTS



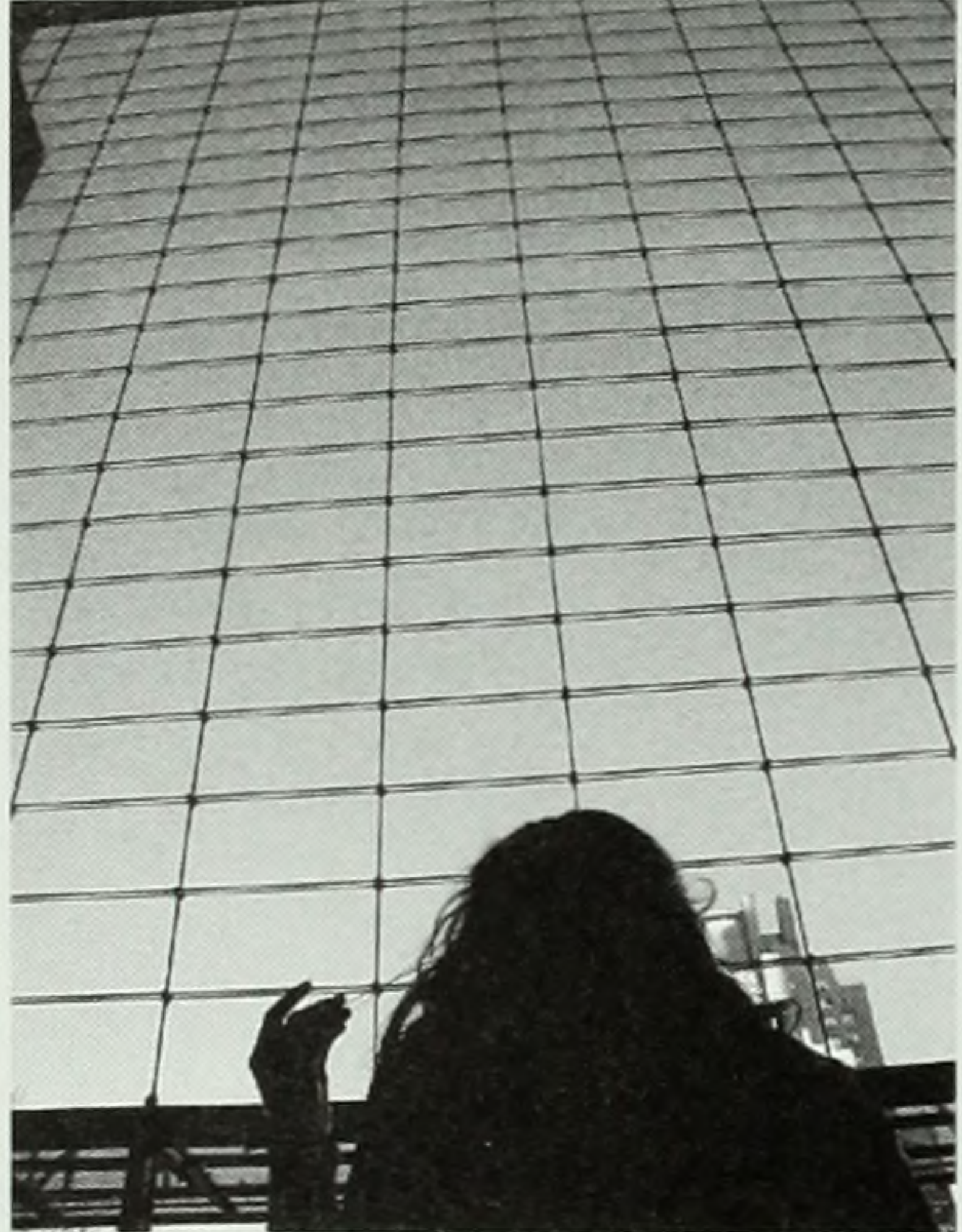

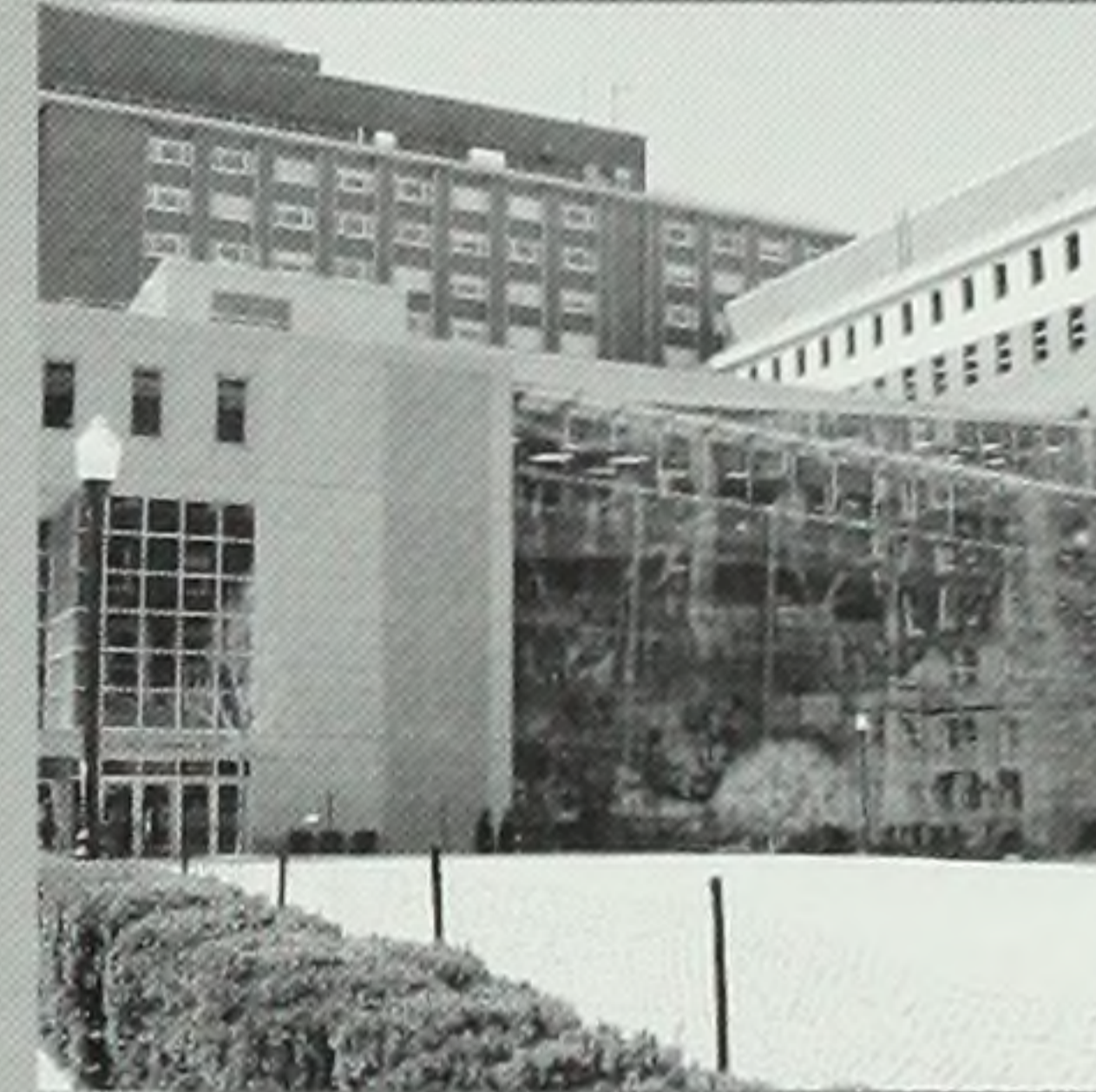
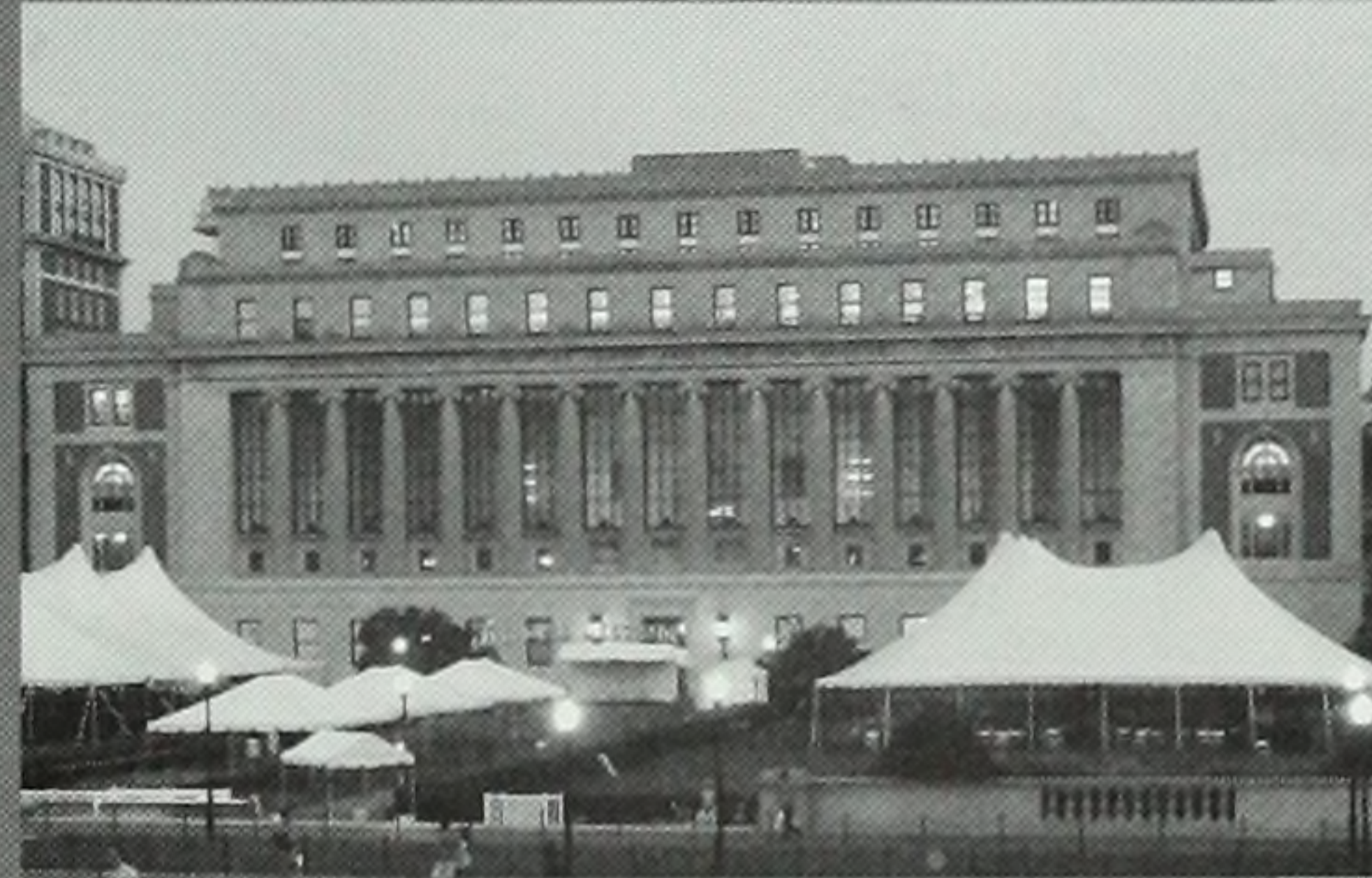
The Sundial's central location on College Walk makes it a prime meeting spot for BC and CU students alike.

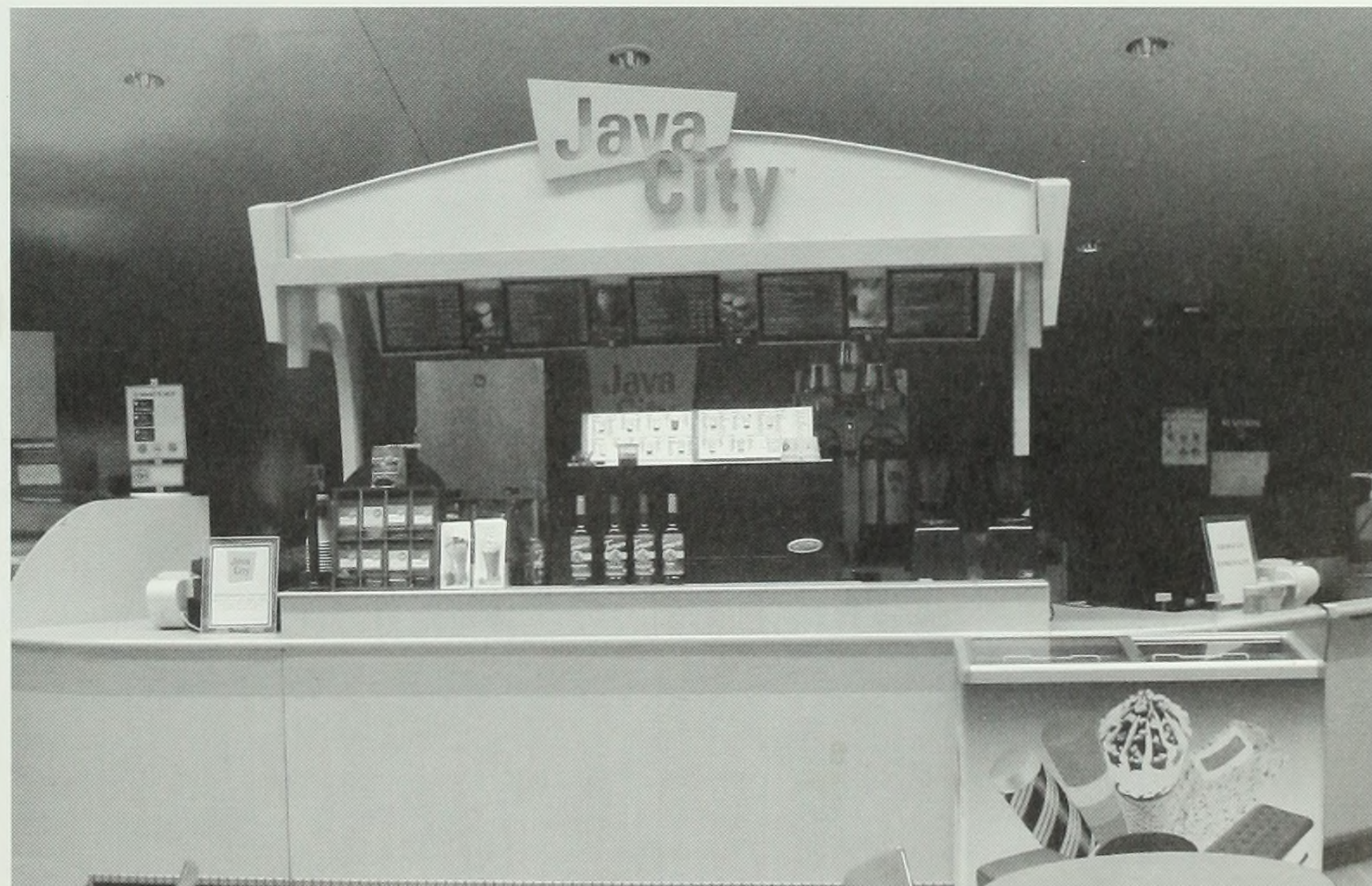


The fountains in front of Low Library signal the end of the school year when they are turned on in the spring.

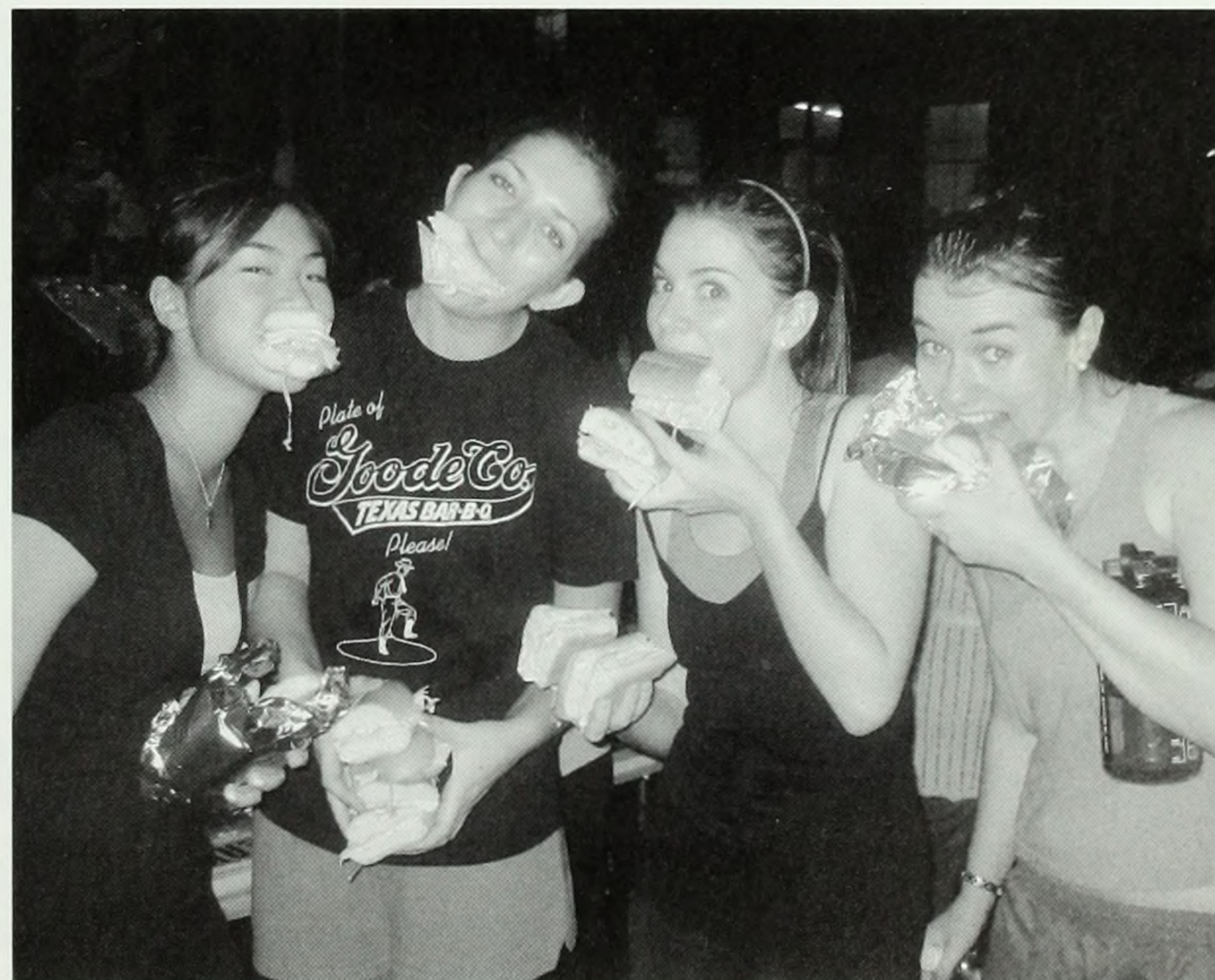
BARNARD TRADITIONS

The Big Sub is one of Barnard's most memorable traditions. This giant sandwich, which stretches from Altschul to the Quad, is created each fall by the McIntosh Activities Council. The Big Sub has something for everyone, with vegetarian and kosher sections. It is the favorite event of many Barnard students. The sub's length changes each year, and not only because of construction projects like the Nexus. In fact, the measured length of the sub always ends in the last two digits of the graduating class. In fall 2007, the sub was 708 feet long, in honor of the Class of 2008. Although the sandwich is devoured within minutes, this event brings the entire campus together for a meal and a break from the midterms season.

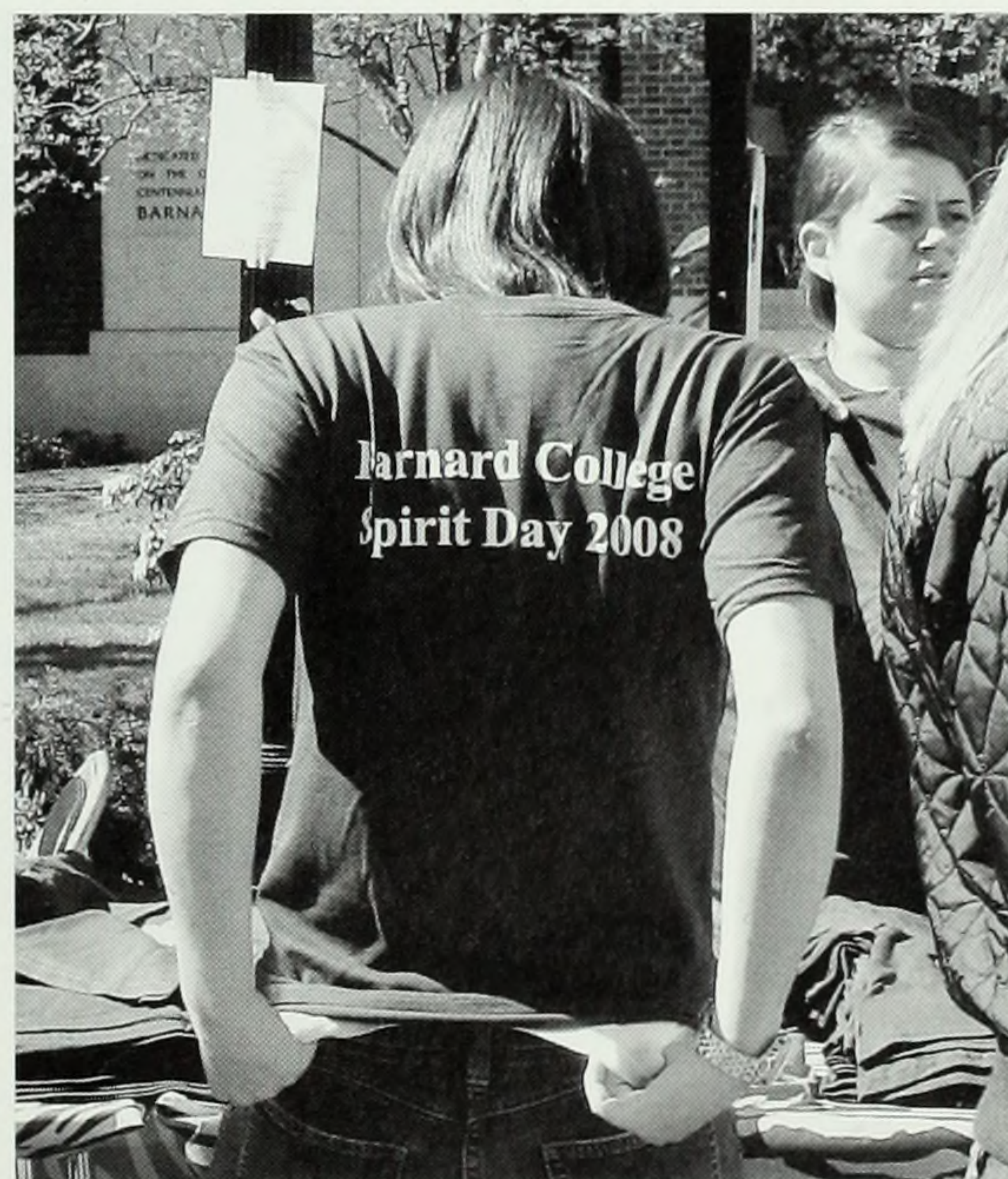
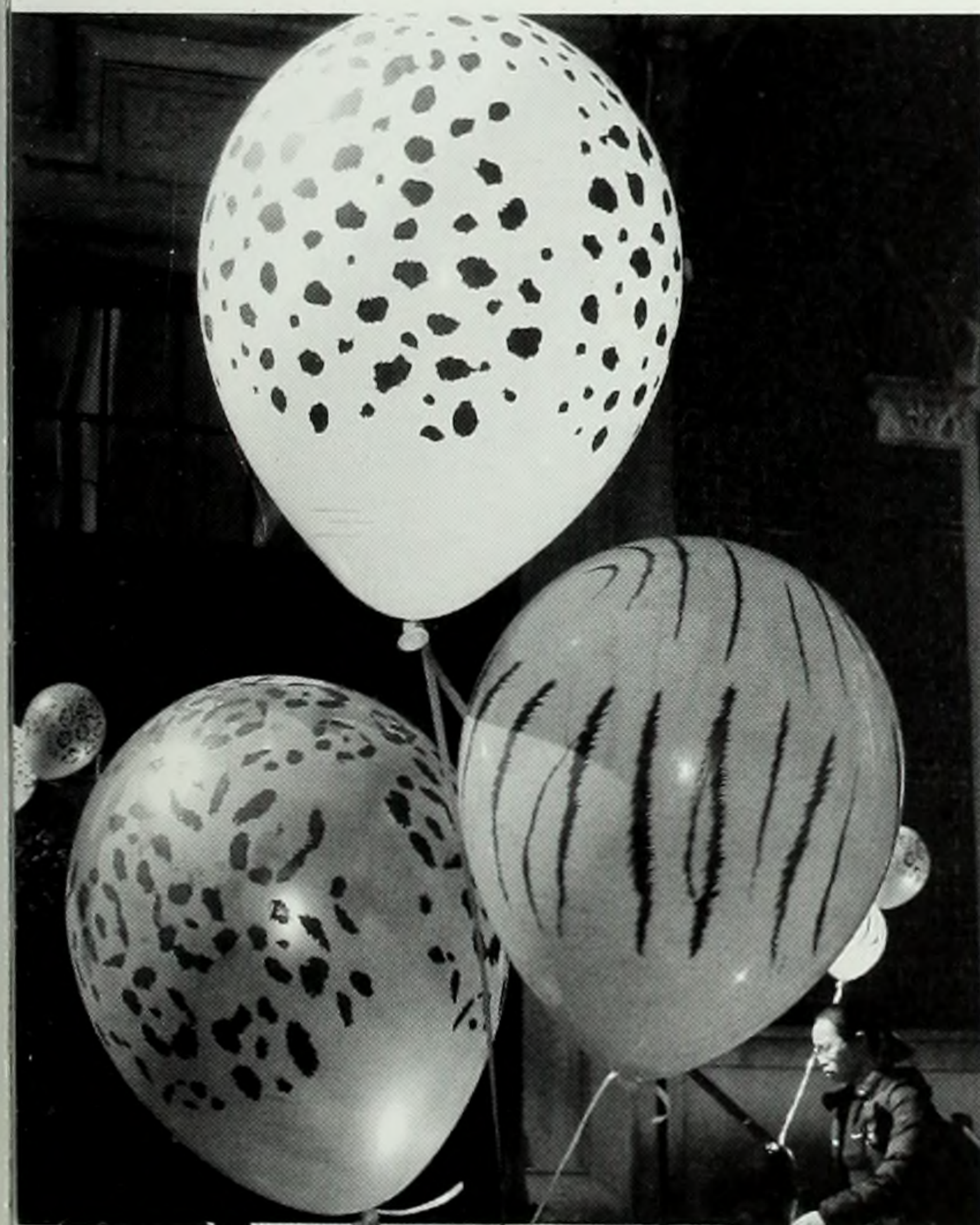
BARNARD TRADITIONS

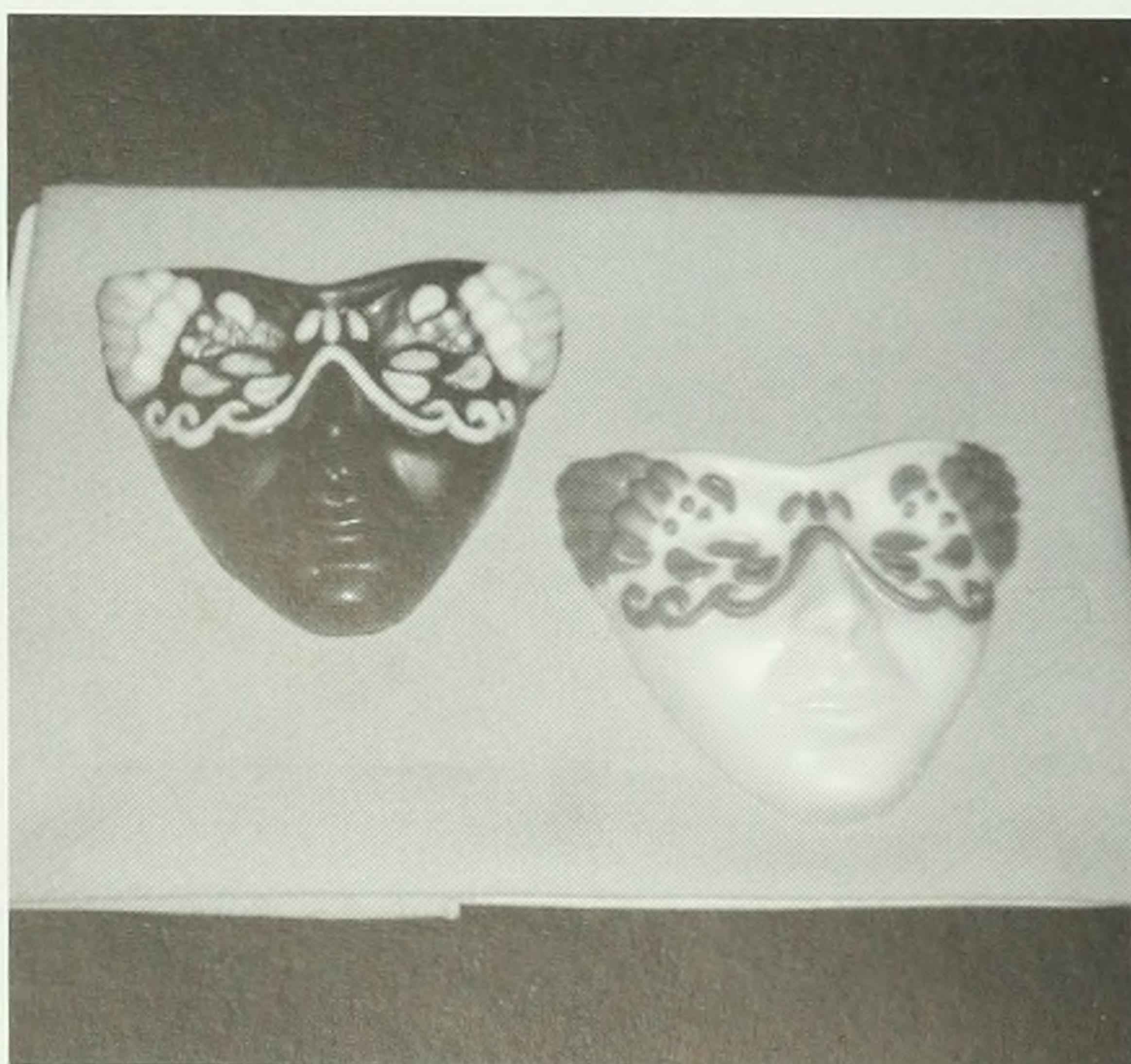
SENIOR WINTER GALA

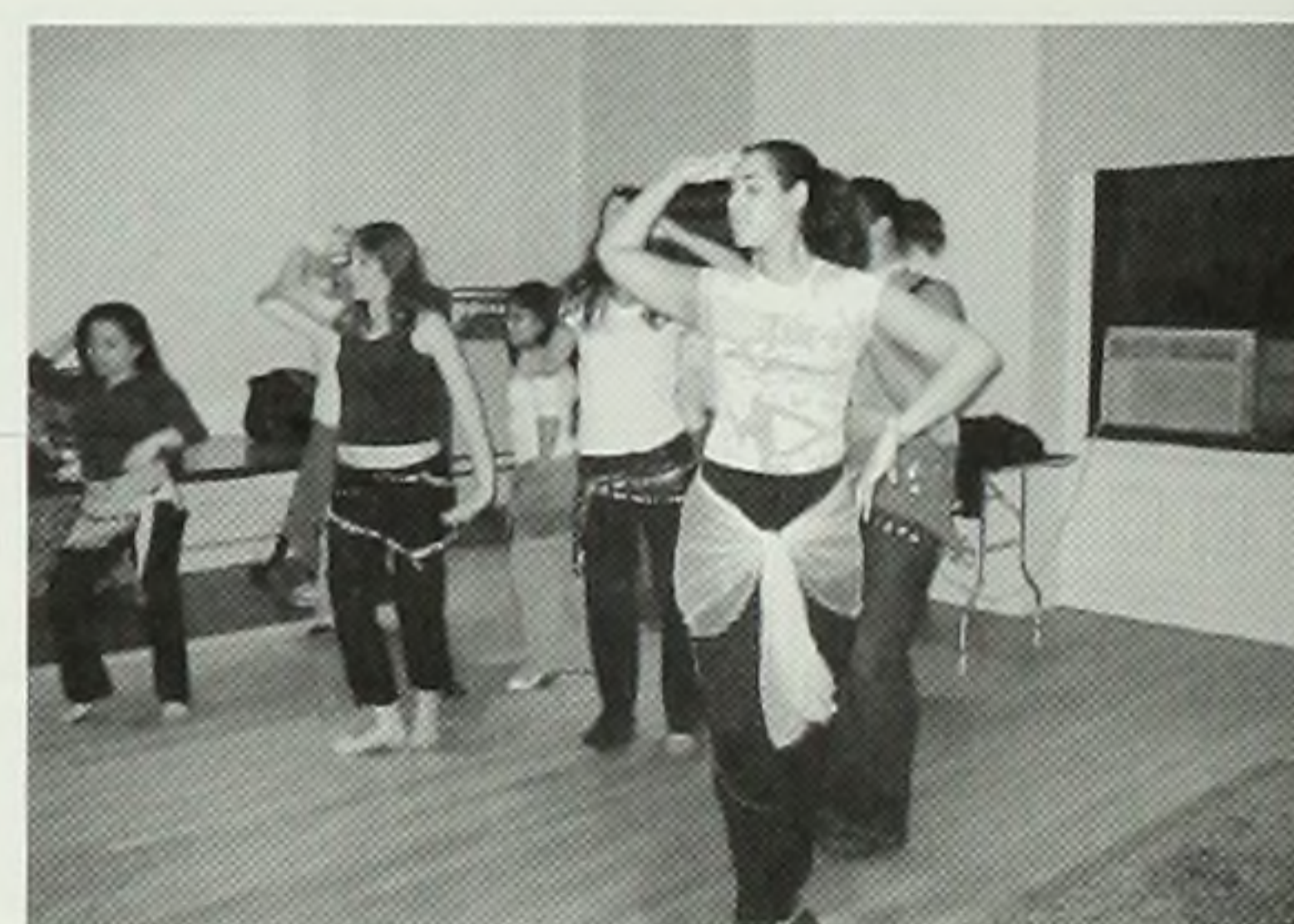
Bacchantae

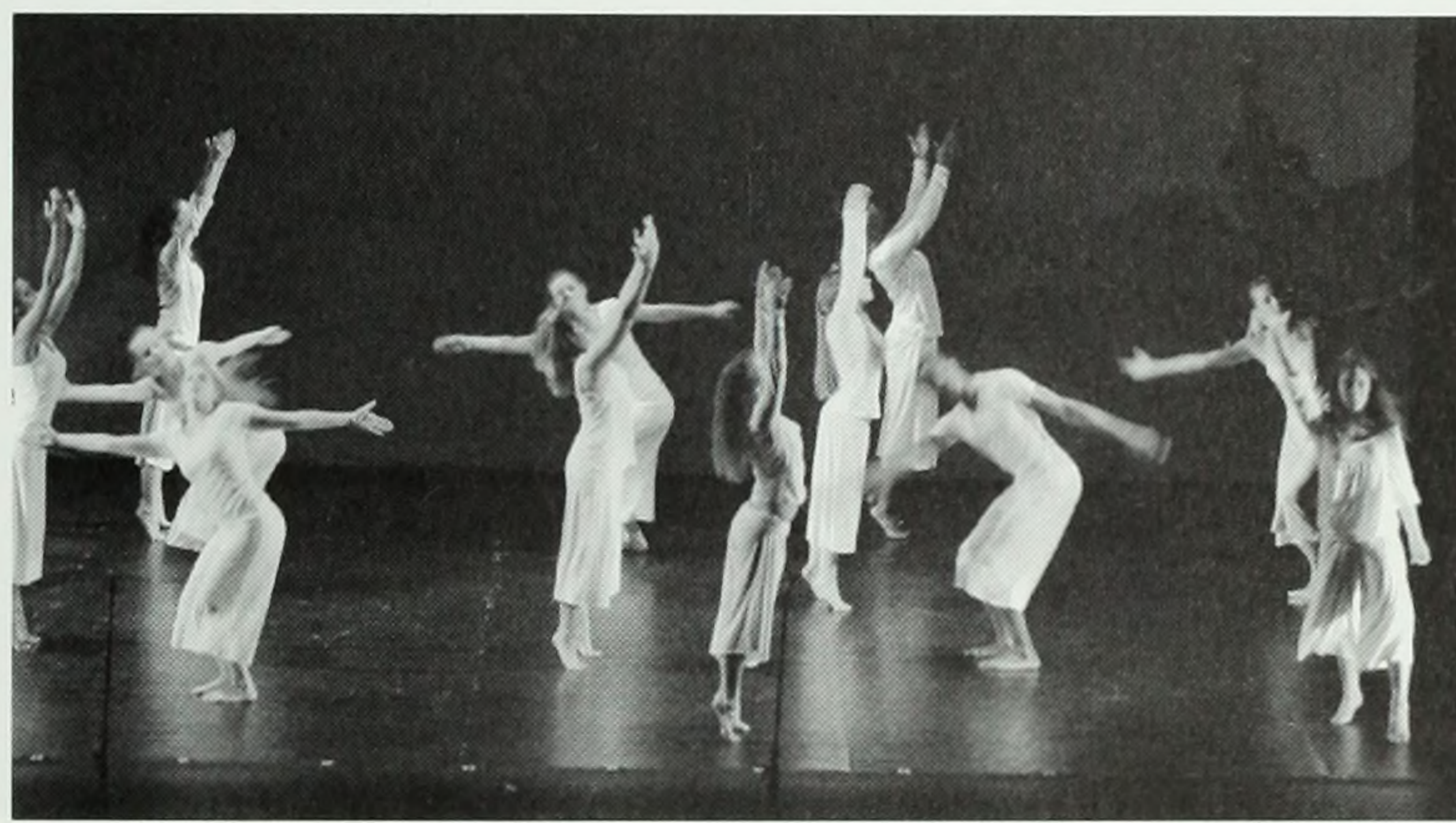
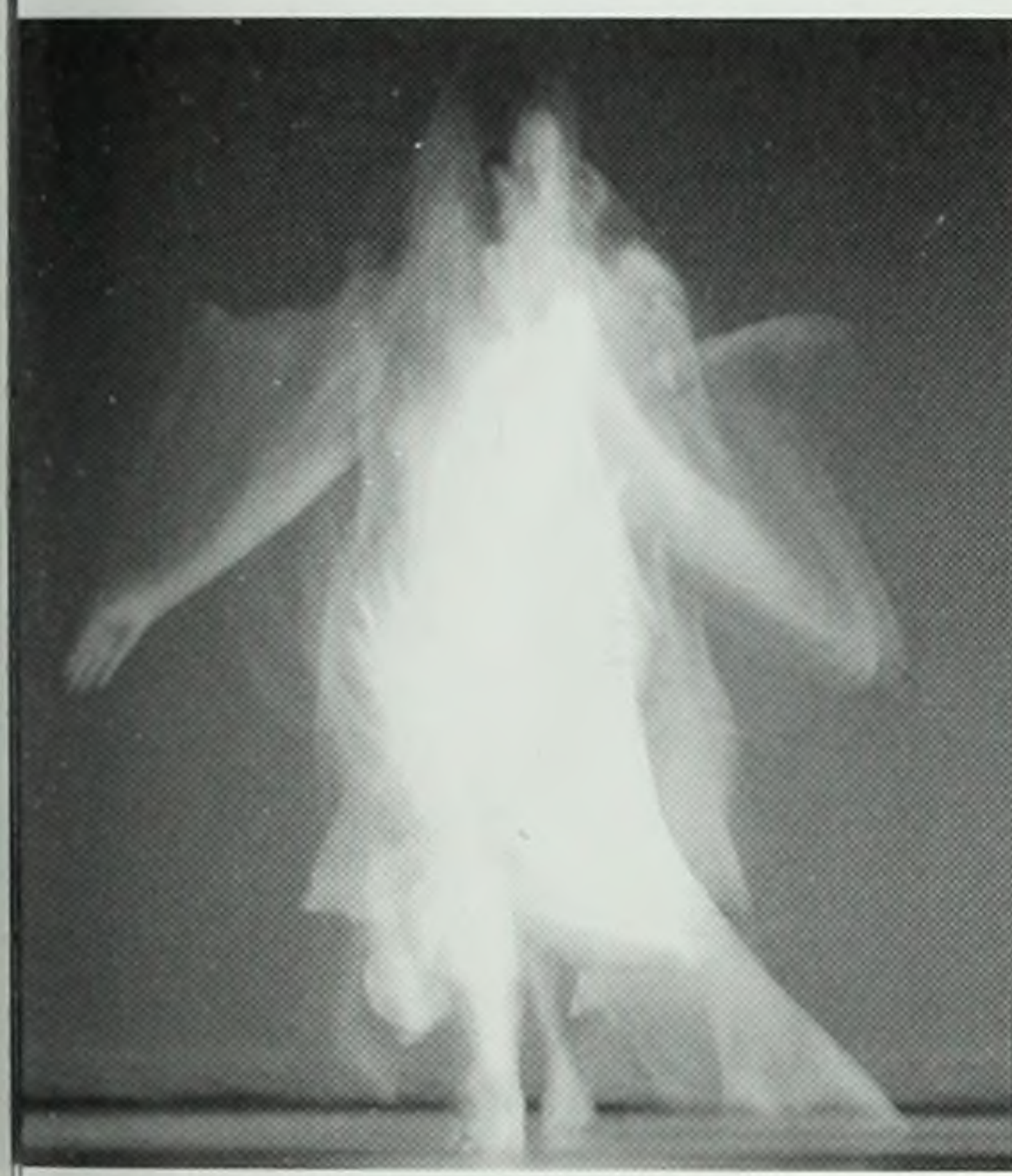
Bach Society

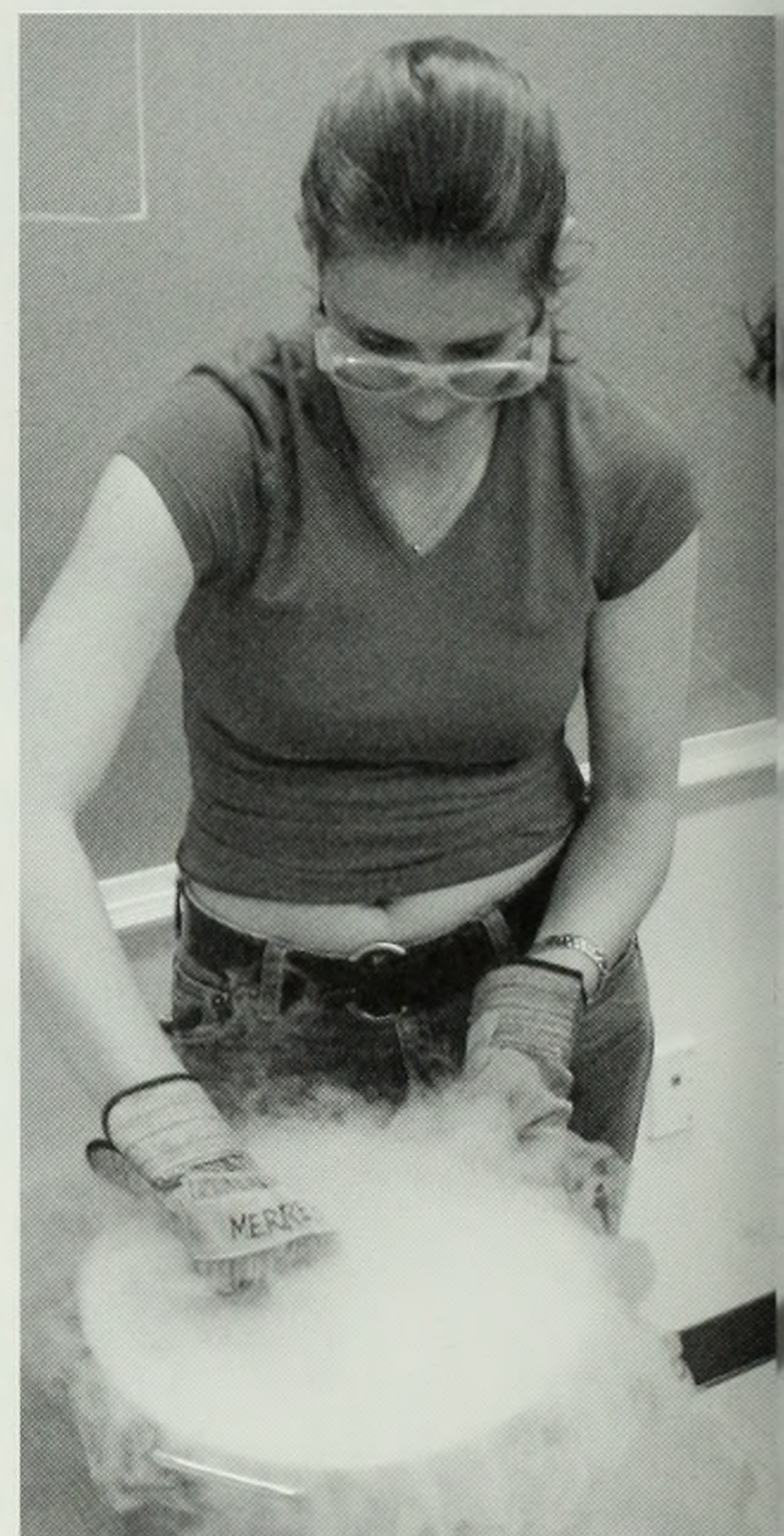
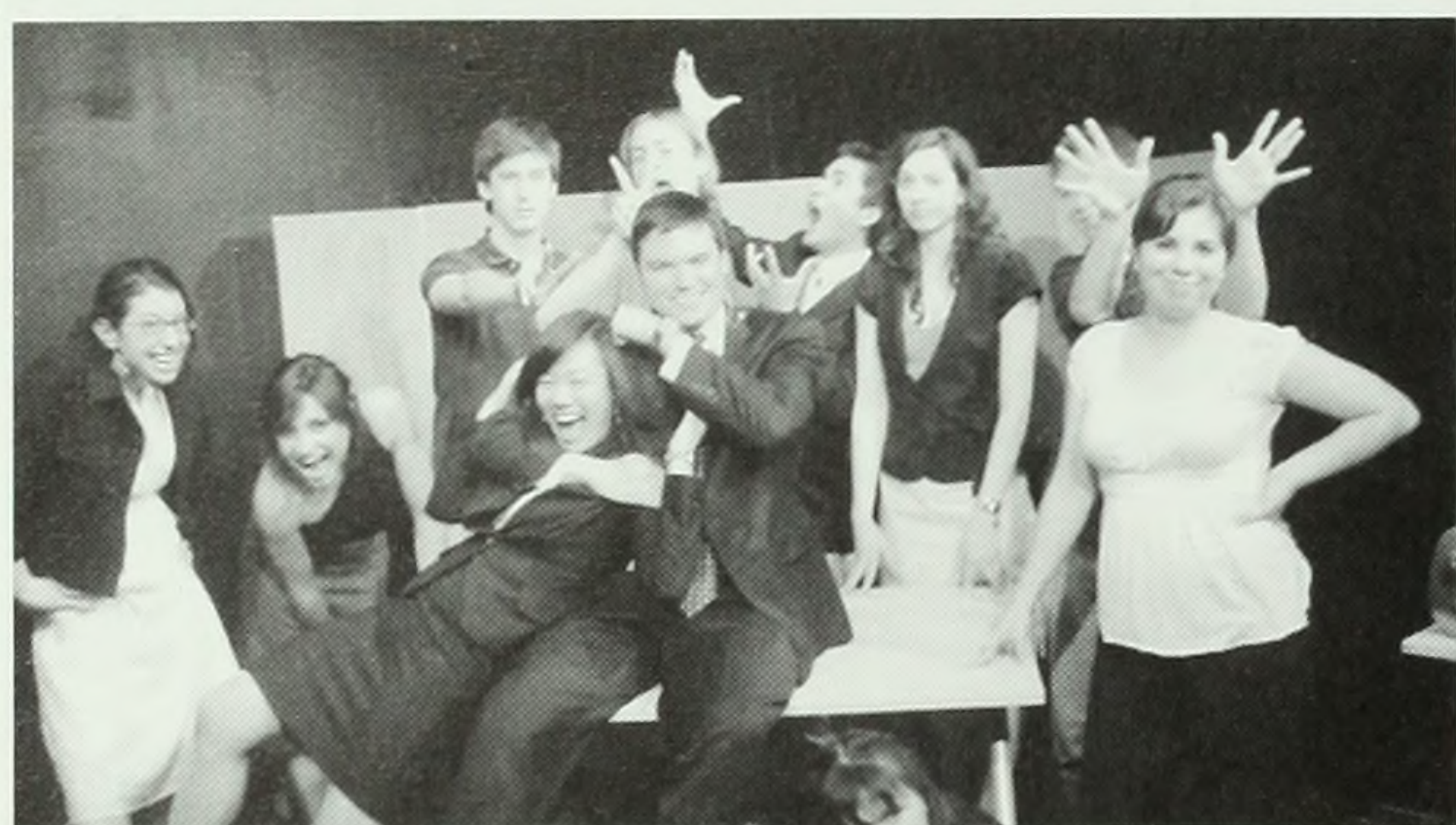


CU Wind Ensemble

Education Society

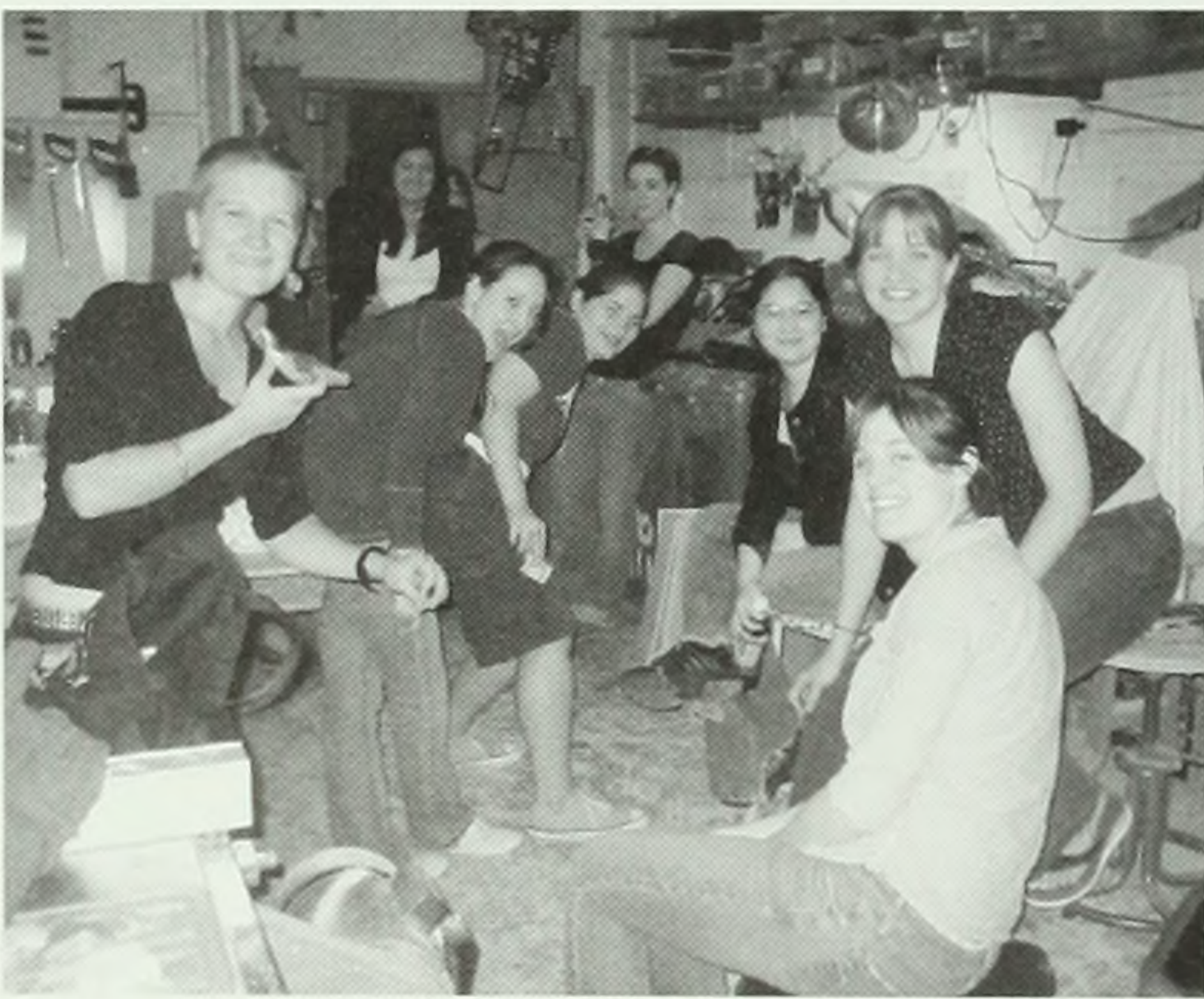

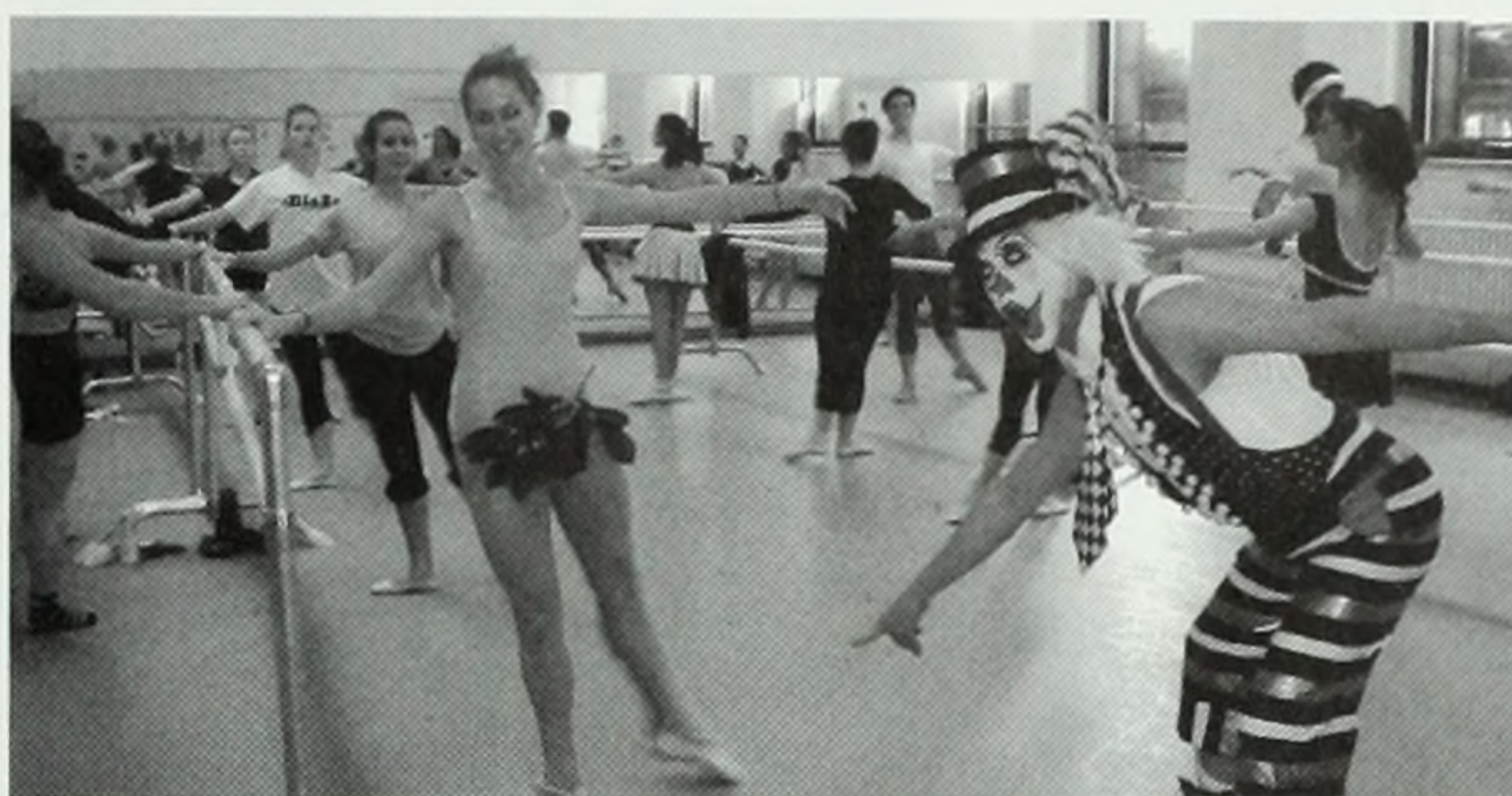


The Philolexian Society of CU

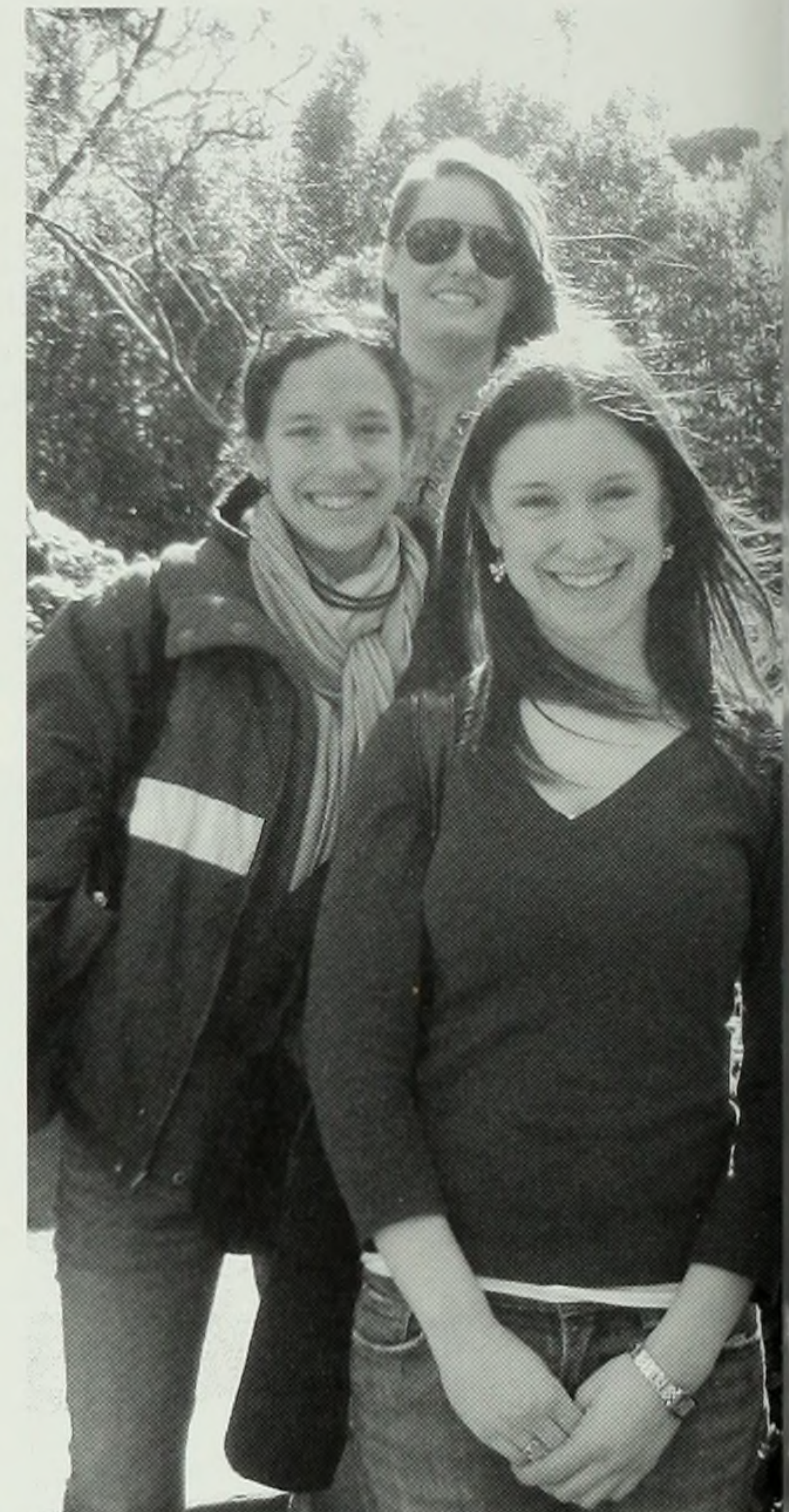
Tablet


Congratulations on reaching this milestone! I will always feel a special connection to your class, since this is my graduation year too.



Commencement - May 20, 2008

Esteemed class of 2008: it is my honor to bring you greetings and best wishes from the faculty of Barnard College. They have been your partners in learning for these four years and they are here today to celebrate your achievements.

They have determined the requirements for your degree and the aims for the curriculum that include critical thinking, effective action, and the self-renewing resourcefulness that is the mark of a liberal arts education. Part of that resourcefulness is derived from the study of gender, and the study of the diversity and commonality of human endeavors in civilizations around the world and through time.


Frances Hesselbein, the 1998 recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom has been cited "as a pioneer for women, diversity and inclusion" for her work as CEO of Girl Scouts from 1976 to 1990. She was a long-term colleague of the late Peter Drucker and now is chair of the Leader to Leader Institute that grew from his work. With Rob Johnston, she has written of the need to examine the future systematically through what Drucker called the right hand of disciplined thinking and the left hand of openness to surprise. She admits that it is harder to enjoy the unexpected, while arguing that organizations and people miss opportunities to adapt to waves of change because they cannot see the waves coming.

She writes: That is why diversity is a core leadership issue. Ultimately this goes beyond racial, ethnic, or gender diversity, although it includes all of them. It has everything to do with how we see the world. I believe successful organizations of the future will work consciously to develop diversity of thought.... Organizations and communities need many eyes. Only by working with people who see things differently can we truly be open to surprise.

So too do we hope that your years here at Barnard, inside and outside the classroom, have supported and challenged you to develop the habits of mind that embrace diversity of thought, that enable you to transform an openness to surprise into understanding and effective action in this ever-changing world. Remember: the right hand of disciplined thinking and the left hand of openness to surprise.

On the evening of your convocation ceremony in August 2004, I quoted American author John Irving: "You can only grow by coming to an end of something, and by beginning something else." On behalf of the Barnard faculty, I affirm that your period of growth here is coming to an end, and that we will be proudly watching as you begin something else.

We send you off through the Barnard gates with the words of Garrison Keillor: "Be well, do good work, and keep in touch."
